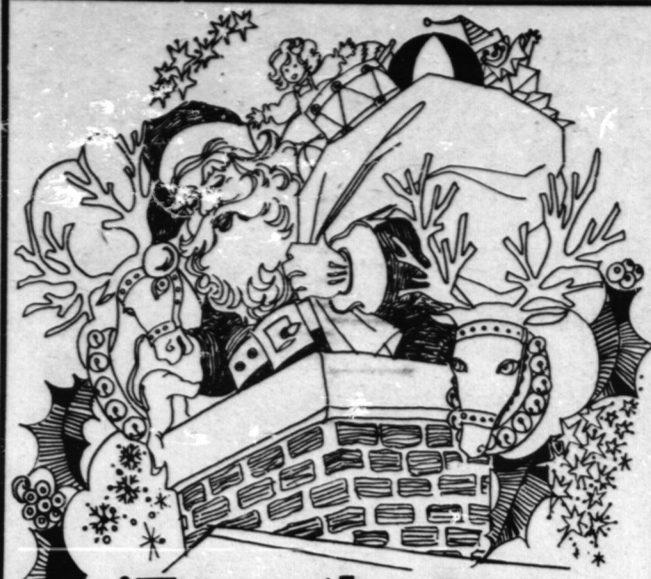


Around & About Cayuga

Common House Plants Dangerous To Children

A scientific exhibit attracting the most attention at a recent convention reported in The Medical Post was one showing household plants which are poisonous to children if they eat them.

Some of the plants shown were: azaleas, laurel, rhododendron, philodendron, poinsettia, hyacinth, narcissus, crocus, English ivy, sweet pea, lily-of-the-valley, and mistletoe.

Common signs and effects of children chewing or swallowing these plants include: stomach and intestinal upset, convulsions, mouth and throat swelling, choking and skin rash.

School For Artists

TORONTO (CP) - An official of the York County board of education has proposed a school for artists aged five to 18, uniting all grades in an intensive

program of dance, drama, music and visual arts.

Stephen Bacsalmasi, the board's superintendent of planning and development, said such a school would include 650 elementary and 350 secondary school pupils. He sees it as another step toward the diversification of public education.

Screening and selecting, he said, "is a very delicate and painful process, but it is necessary." He wants the school known for its serious commitment to the arts, and feels there is a danger of students enrolling for a lark.

"The artists will have to bring about in the students a gradual infusion of the idea of discipline of each art - a slow process, but it will result in a high standard later."

He said in an interview that there would also be courses in mathematics, language, social science, and other non-art subjects.
