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

# Ontario To Ensure Pollution Controls

SIMCOE - Ontario will ensure that Texaco (Canada) Ltd. will install the latest technical equipment to keep air and water pollution at a minimum, a regional study group was told at a meeting here last week.

Deputy Reeve George Pleasance of Simcoe said Energy and Resources Minister George Kerr has stated the department will do all in its power to ensure that both Steico and Texaco install the best in pollution controls.

Mr. Pleasance made the report to a joint meeting of the Haldimand-Norfolk Study Committee and the Ontario Association of Counties and Regions.

He also said that Darcy McKeough, Municipal Affairs Minister, is advising that all residential areas be kept away from the Texaco site.

In the meantime the Walpole Planning Board has decided it will visit the most modern refining plant it can find before making any decision on a zoning change in the township's official plan and zoning bylaw.

Company officials attending last week stressed their plans for anti-pollution controls for the 50,000-barrel-a-day refinery.

The company representative stated at the meeting, if the planning changes are approved by the township and the Municipality, construction of the refinery will start right away.

He also said the plant will be constructed to fit into its surrounding rather than "be a scar on the environment."

## Study Committee Wants More Money

The Haldimand-Norfolk study committee for regional planning in the two counties wants more funds.

The official subsidy for the committee set by the Ontario government was a maximum of \$10,000 and the group wants this increased by \$7,500.

The budget set by the study committee is now \$35,000.

Half of the budget will be shared by Norfolk and Haldimand Counties.

The committee cost rate payers in the two counties \$10,269 since its inception last September.

## Weekly Weather

## Some Farmers Not Economical By 1980

"It has been estimated that given present rates of exit we will still have twice as many farmers as can economically earn a decent living from agriculture at the end of the decade."
