

OPP Report

At a recent bus seminar held in Cayuga attended by 60 bus drivers, O.P.P. Personnel and a member of the Department of Transport, it was learned that the motoring public are still ignoring a school bus when it is stopped with red lights flashing for the purpose of picking up or discharging school students. If the present conditions exist, it can only result in one of our children becoming Haldimand County's first fatality.

At present, two officers of this detachment have been assigned both morning and afternoon to enforce this infraction and no warnings will be given. A yellow school bus has the same meaning as any yellow traffic sign indicating a caution, therefore we must reduce our speed and stop if necessary.

Recent complaints have been received that school bus drivers are not stopping for railway crossings. The law states: "No school bus operator is required to stop at a railway crossing that is protected by gates, signal lights or a flagman. If these conditions do not exist,

then the driver must stop within 15 feet of the crossing.

Officers of the Cayuga Detachment investigated a total of 10 motor vehicle collisions over the period of Jan. 25-31. Two injuries were sustained as a result of these collisions.

Officers patrolled a total of 6,005 miles, issued 22 warnings and 24 charges to motorists. In Provincial Judges Court, Cayuga, Jan. 28, 10 convictions were registered.

General occurrences investigated were: 17 requests for assistance, one theft, two other Criminal Code offences, two break and enters, four Liquor Control Act investigations resulting in five charges.

A recent investigation by Const. W. DeWitt into a Snow Machine accident which resulted in serious injuries, three charges of no insurance and a charge of no licence plates were laid under the Motorized Snow Vehicle Act.

One driver was charged with impaired driving as result of a car accident.

Dear Mr. Martin: We have to replace our refrigerator soon and are in the process of shopping around for a new one. Do you have any tips on what to look for in a new model and also how long should we pay on it? Mrs. D. F.

Let me answer the latter part of your question first - "how long should the instalment contract run?" The rule for major electrical appliances is about twenty-four months, but since the refrigerator is probably the most expensive electrical appliance you have in your house, you could extend the contract to about 30 months.

In connection with the length of instalment contracts, you might also be interested in the following as a guide for the purchase of other items: Furniture - Between one year and 18 months. Jewelry - Generally 12 months is the limit. Television - About 18 months. Automobile - Usually 30 to 36 months.

Remember, though, that you should never really stretch yourself to the limit. The instalment contract that is paid off conveniently leaves more satisfaction behind it than one that becomes burdensome before the last payment is due. Generally, though, you should not still be making payments on a purchase or a loan long after it has ceased to benefit you.

So far as selecting a model to fit your needs, it's very difficult to advise you. I can only tell you that you could consider the size of your family in relation to the size of the unit you intend to buy.

The best advice I could give you is to discuss this with the appliance people at your department or appliance store.

Certainly, you will want to consider such things as adequate freezer space and automatic defroster. An automatic element is a very convenient item to have, but remember that it will cost you about \$75 more than a non-automatic model. Remember, too, that operation costs (electricity) will be about doubled.

If your old refrigerator is still in pretty good condition you might want to keep it for additional storage and freezer space. You won't get much (if anything) with it as a trade-in, but it will provide you some savings when you shop for meat and other items on sale which may be frozen.

When you do decide to buy the model that best suits your needs, be sure and read the instalment contract very carefully. Be certain you understand everything in it, including all guarantees and warranties.

W.J. Marsh Speaker

Mrs. W. J. Marsh, Hamilton District Coordinator for the Heart Foundation, gave an interesting, educational speech to the Knights of Columbus Council on January 20, 1970.

Mrs. Marsh spoke on the Heart Fund and how its monies were used for research. She said that many people felt that the Heart Fund was a charitable organization rather than being research orientated. Of the 70,000 Canadians with heart trouble, more than half of these are children.

After explaining what a heart attack was, and how one might try to avoid it, she displayed several artificial heart parts. One of these was a pacemaker which is used to create a regular heartbeat. Perhaps in the future, these pacemakers will be just as rechargeable as car batteries! Other artificial parts included heart valves and arteries.

After a question and answer period, Mr. Tony Szalay, the lecturer, thanked the evening's speaker.

The National Hockey League, and especially Boston Bruins, missed Ted Green.

"But not as much as I missed the NHL", says the Bruins defenceman who was sidelined last September by a skull fracture suffered in a stick-swinging duel during a pre-season exhibition match.

The rugged 29-year-old made his first public appearance since the injury at the league's annual awards banquet in St. Louis on the eve of the East-West all-star game Jan. 20.

Some 900 dinner guests applauded loud and long when the St. Boniface, Man., native was introduced as a member of the league's second all-star team of 1968-69.

Green said after the dinner he feels he has fully recovered from the injury although he faces another operation to insert a steel plate in his skull.

He denied reports that he has been skating since he was released from hospital in October, but he still looks forward to making a comeback next season.

"Definitely, I'll be back next year", he said.

A veteran of eight full seasons with the Bruins, Green had come to be regarded as a hard-hitting defenceman who could break up an opponent's attack and spark his Boston team-mates to renewed efforts.

Bruins' high-scoring centre Phil Esposito was asked if Green's absence has perhaps meant the difference between winning and losing some games this season.

"Well, any good team should be able to adjust to having players out with injuries", Esposito said.

"This happens to every club and the rest of the are supposed to take the slack."

"But, sure, we miss Teddie a heck of a lot. When you lose an all-star your team is bound to suffer and it could mean the difference in a few losses."

Esposito didn't find it necessary to mention the obvious efforts of the team's other all-star defenceman, Bobby Orr, but praised instead the efforts of the other Bruins rearguards - Don Awrey, Dallas Smith, Rick Smith and Gary Doak.

"But we'll still be happy to get Ted back", Esposito said.
