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

Bylaw Officer For Jarvis

Jarvis will have a bylaw officer. This was the decision of council Tuesday when Raymond Fleet was hired to take over the job.

Mr. Fleet will be on probation for a month under his contract with the Village.

Mr. Fleet, 46, spent 17 years in the army and receives a full pension. His salary for village duties will be \$1.50 an hour. He will work 10 hours a week.

His duties will include enforcing parking violations, collecting dog tags and enforce other village bylaws.

These duties were enforced before the resignation of a village policeman by the village police department.

Policing of the village has since been taken over by the Ontario Provincial Police, Cayuga Detachment.

In other business council passed a subdivision and boundary control bylaw.

Walpole Objects GRCA Assessment For Dams

Walpole Township wants Haldimand water supplies subsidized before the township spends money on the Grand River Conservation Authority's plan for five dams on the Grand River.

This was the consensus of the council meeting after hearing a Pilkington Township resolution stating that the Grand River authority was assessing the rural municipalities involved in the authority too much for benefits they will get from the proposal.

Reeve Hugh Greenfield said the five dams are proposed mainly for flood control and to provide drinking water for Brantford. Consequently I don't favor the project.

"I think only two dams are needed to control floods that rarely occur", he said.

Mr. Greenfield said there has been discussions held about a Lake Erie pipeline for the Haldimand area and the provincial departments should get together to decide what they will do about water supplies for this area.

The township sent a resolution to the GRCA supporting Pilkington Township's motion.

The Grand River dam project, at an estimated cost of \$44,200,000, has been approved by GRCA. The development is to be stretched out over the next 16 years.

Mr. Greenfield said there has been discussions held about a Lake Erie pipeline for the Haldimand area and the provincial departments should get together to decide what they will do about water supplies for this area.

Reeve Dr. W. E. Austin told council he had had complaints from Clarence Smith of Jarvis who 'had been feeding wild birds at his residence but found they were being shot by children with BB guns.

Council decided to put a notice in the paper saying that no fire arms are allowed in the village and their use is also contrary to Ontario hunting laws.

Dr. Austin commented a fine for an offence against the Ontario act could be as high as \$100.

UNICEF For Nigeria

Help U.N.I.C.E.F. help Nigerian children. U.N.I.C.E.F. (United Children's Fund) supplied assistance to Nigeria since 1954, with programs for the control of leprosy, yaws and kwashiorkor, in the development of rural health services, expanding education facilities and the supply of food.

U.N.I.C.E.F.'s emergency assistance began with the delivery of food and drugs to both sides of the fighting lines, during the Nigeria-Biafra war, specifically aiding mothers and children.

Because of the success of this work and because of its non-partisan nature, the Nigerian Government recognized the work of U.N.I.C.E.F. and welcomes its continuance during the vital period of rehabilitation which had just started to supply food, medical centres and supplies. The Red Cross is the only other relief organization recognized by the Nigerian Government.

U.N.I.C.E.F. immediately flew in fifteen tons of "K Mix I" which is a casein, sugar, skim milk, high protein mix which can be fed nasally to victims of severe kwashiorkor.

\$145,000 For Centre

The sum of \$145,679 has been given or pledged to the Recreation Centre Building Fund by citizens of Simcoe and Norfolk County at the end of the first week of the public phase of a campaign to raise \$845,000. B. W. Anderson, campaign General Chairman, announced today.

This money is being raised by voluntary donations to build a recreation complex on Norfolk County Fairgrounds where two acres of land have been donated by Norfolk Agricultural Society. The centre is to contain an indoor swimming pool, a theatre auditorium, arts and crafts areas and an exercise room.

Stelco will spend \$1 billion to increase steelmaking over the next 10 years.

This was predicted by H. M. Griffith, president of Stelco, in a speech to the Canadian Steel Warehouse Association in Toronto last week.

He said production will double by 1980 to 23 million ingot tons. The total industry output will grow to more than 17 million tons by 1975.

Stelco's average capital spending in the 1959-63 period was nearly \$50 million, rising to \$81 million in the four years until 1968.

"Barring government action that might abrogate this trend I expect the capital investment growth, which lead to expansion of the industry in the 1960s will extend into the 1970s," he said.
