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Federation Facts

The ground hog may or may not have seen his shadow but spring is on its way, which means a number of things to the Haldimand farmer.

If he is going to have an organization such as Ontario Federation of Agriculture represent him, and provide the kind of service the farmer needs to-day, he will have to have a direct service membership by April 1.

Meetings are being planned throughout the county to explain the O.F.A. and service membership.

Certainly the recent change in freight rates on western feed grain will concern the Ontario farmer. There will be an increased cost in growing grain.

Regardless of whether it is being grown to sell, or to feed, it cannot be grown at a cost to the farmer of more than the market value.

In regards to cost, the Federation strongly recommends that Haldimand farmers shop around a little before buying their fertilizer for spring. This is because prices on some analysis vary as much as \$14 a ton delivered.

It is also suggested farmers who are considering importing fertilizer from the U.S.A. make sure of the price delivered to their farm.

This should be compared to what local dealers will sell for, to make sure that

importing would be saving.

Farmers should consider increases in yields a result of new varieties. Some seed dealers in the county are not handling these new varieties. The O.F.A. also recommends that farmers spend a little time looking around for varieties because they are available at some places.

The importance of the yield in crop production is pointed out in the crop cost study published in Haldimand County 1968. Corn cost range from \$66.85 to \$97.59 per acre. Profit range from \$54.65 to a loss of \$14.96 per acre. Barley ranges in cost from \$34.50 to \$70.86 per acre, profit from \$17.75 to a loss of \$4.31 per acre.
