Howard Nodwell, Agricultural Engineer, Lindsay, spoke of pollution at the recent Hog Producers' Annual Meeting. A "Suggested Code of Practice" was discussed for the establishment of new livestock buildings, renovation of existing buildings and disposal of animal wastes. The code was worked out in co-operation with the Air Management Branch and the Ontario Water Resources Commission. Those considering new hog and poultry buildings should check the code while still in the planning stage.

Ralph Cherry, secretary of the Haldimand Holstein Club, advises that plans are now completed for the annual barn meeting to be held on Sat., Feb. 28. The speaker this year will be Dr. Moe Freeman. Club Directors who attended the local A. I. Unit meeting recently felt that more breeders of the area should have the opportunity to hear him. John Kater, R.R.1, Selkirk, will host the barn meeting. Another project of the Association will be a bonus of \$15.00 to be paid on a one per farm basis for the best 20 boars purchased by Haldimand producers. To qualify a minimum index of 115 would be required.

Detail on both projects will be mailed to producers in a week or so.

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New Fruit Wines On Market

Fruits other than grapes are processed as fruit wines - wines just a suggestion of essence, caused by the use of carbon dioxide in the wine.

Mr. R. R. Crowther, Horticultural Products Laboratory, Vineland, has been working with standard and new varieties of fruit for the last 10 years. He has found that these

fruits have a lower sugar content than grapes. Some fruits are high in acid, and have little juice, and modifications are necessary to produce wines. These modifications might include the addition of sugar and/or alcohol; a yeast stimulant (di-basic ammonium phosphate); and a pectic enzyme to help in the extraction of juice and the clarification of the wine.

Firm, ripe fruits are used for fermentation. Two types of fermentation are used: a skin fermentation, for stone fruits and berries, like cherry and strawberry; and a juice fermentation, using only pressed juice, such as apple.

The effervescence can be produced by either of two procedures. In one method, yeast and a calculated amount of sugar are added to a measured amount of wine. The mixture is placed in a sea led bottle and the fermentation allowed to proceed to conclusion. The second method involves the addition of carbon dioxide to the finished or fermented wine.

Both methods of carbonation can result in dangerous explosions through miscalculations. During 1969 standard and new varieties of fruit wines were processed as crackling wines. The newer varieties of fruit have additional modifications to the standard varieties and will be graded during 1970.

The wines are rated by members of the Horticultural Products Laboratory staff, Ontario Control Board of Ontario. Some of these "crackling" fruit wines and grape wines are available on the market.
