Editorial Comment

A Jumbo Problem

A new era in air travel is just on the threshold, but some disquieting news in the last few days gives rise to fears that the door, as far as many Canadians are concerned, may not open for a while yet.

The jumbo jets, which will carry more than 300 passengers each at slightly better than the speed of the standard jets which carry about half that number, already have taken to the air and will soon be in regular passenger service in the United States.

The first to service Canada will be used by Air France, which hopes to introduce them early this summer on its flights between Montreal and Paris. Air Canada has been planning to start its jumbo service early next year on flights linking Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver, and British Overseas Airways Corp. planned daily flights to London from Toronto by next summer.

But a hitch appears to have occurred as far as Toronto's already jammed international airport at nearby Malton is concerned. Last week the federal transport department announced that the Malton airport expansion program, aimed at handling jumbo traffic, has been delayed for at least six months because of delay in shipments caused by the 1969 steel strikes.

The \$30,000,000 first phase of Malton's expansion was to have been ready by April next year, in time for both Air Canada and BOAC. Now no one seems to know what will happen when the king-size jets start arriving at and departing from Toronto.

The major problem is passenger-handling, rather than plane-handling facilities. Most existing runways can be used by the jumbos, and have been during their months of test-flying. And the crowding of flying-control facilities would actually be eased by the advent of the jumbos, since many more passengers would be handled by the control of one aircraft than is the case now.

The big problem is how to handle peak arrival and departure crowds — one that has plagued every major airport in the last few years as more and more passengers took to the airways. Even on domestic flights, the problems of baggage-handling and lack of parking facilities have created nightmare jams at the airports, since arrivals and departures tend to cluster at certain times of the day or night.

But much of today's jet travel involves international flights, and the dreary course through customs and immigration is a major headache to travellers even now. In a facility where even one arrival of a hundred-odd passengers causes long lineups at the inspection desks, one can only shudder at the thought of four or five jumbos depositing some 1,500 passengers at the gates at the same time.

It seems evident now that even clearing up what delay may have been caused to construction by the steel strike will be only a palliative. What is needed is an entirely new concept — some sort of breakthrough — in the basic philosophy of handling air travellers.

On The Farm Front

Corrugated plastic tubing for drainage of agricultural soils was recently installed two different ways at the Ridgetown College of Agricultural Technology. One method used the conventional trencher; the other used a mole plow, a method that is new to Ontario. Speed of installation with the mole plow can be more than 80 feet per minute, roughly three times as fast as a wheel trencher.

One purpose of the experiment is to compare the two methods of installation. The experiment also may determine the long-term physical durability of the tubing. Several feet of the new drainage system will be uncovered for inspection at various times over the coming years.
