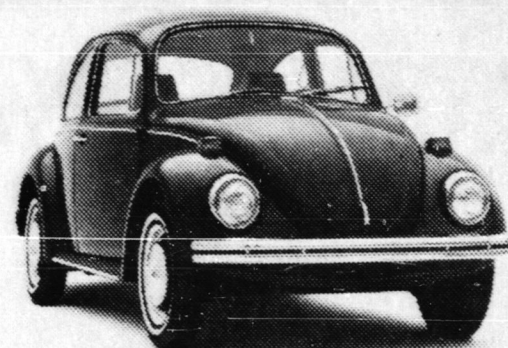

## Commercial Fishing

PORT DOVER - The extreme cold spell has ended the commercial fishing season here after operating five weeks past last year's closing date.

Tugs from the harbor, however, have been trying to break ice, to get out to open water.

For the last five days they have failed to do so.

The fishing season was extended indefinitely from Dec. 15 by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests because catches of Perch and Smelt were improving. Also, there was a steady market for them.

Fishermen described the freeze-up as the worst in 40 years.

The Freeze-up may have ended the best season for the fresh water fishing tugs. Also, reported frozen in are tugs at Port Burwell and Port Stanley.

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## Hydro Bows To Protest

# LINE WILL TAKE NEW ROUTE

Nanticoke: Ontario Hydro's feeder line from its new plant here will not go through the Six Nations Indian Reserve. This was disclosed today by Leo Vamplew, hydro public relations officer.

He said "It has been decided the line won't follow the proposed route through the reserve."

"We have made a presentation to the Haldimand-Norfolk study committee about an alternative route."

"Our next step is to approach the municipalities and planning boards in this area to determine the routes that will be open to us."

"After this we can decide what route we will follow", he said.

Hydro ran into stiff opposition from officials of Six Nations when it was proposed the line go across the reserve.

devaluation - the data suggests "at least a tacit agreement" to maintain Canadian prices, thus denying Canadian farmers the lower prices that would otherwise result.

The Commission estimated this decision increased the sterling profit margins of the manufacturers by two to three times.

If Canadian farmers had been able to import tractors directly from British dealers or agents, they would have saved an estimated \$8,600,000 in 1967 on all tractors up to at least 60 horsepower, even after paying their own ocean and domestic shipping costs, the Commission estimated.

After devaluation in 1968 the saving would have been \$14,900,000. The 1969 saving would be similar to that in 1968 - perhaps slightly smaller since the volume of sales was likely lower in 1969.

However, the Commission found evidence that the manufacturers have recently sought to prevent tractors moving from the lower-priced British market to the artificially high-priced Canadian market.

All major British tractor manufacturers - Ford, Massey-Ferguson, International Harvester, David Brown and British Leyland Motors (Nuffield) - have inserted clauses in their dealer agreements to prevent the dealers from directly

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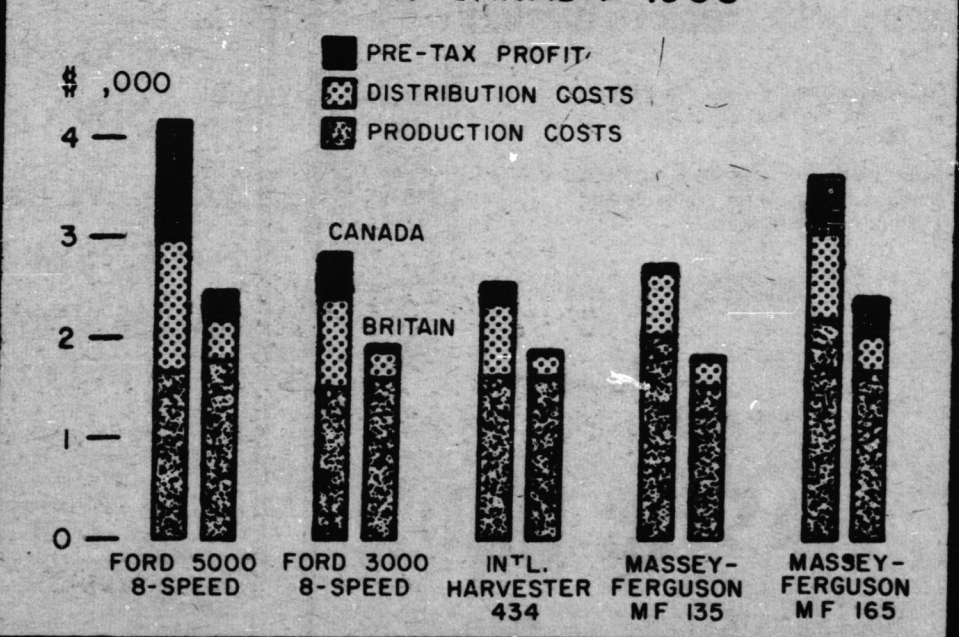
