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## Federation Facts

In regard to the matter of Insurance I wonder if many farmers realize how much our changing economy and developing society have on their insurance needs.

These few questions might be worthy of consideration.

1. With the industrial development in our county and surrounding areas, and the resulting increase in people traveling our Township and county roads. How does this effect the farmers liability?

2. As the law requires a farmer to have special license for machinery on the roads over specific demerations. And noting all too few farmers seem to realize this. How does this affect the farmer and his insurance?

3. With the increasing number of people in the area not familiar with agriculture, how does this effect the farmers insurance needs?

4. In view of our entire economy facing an extreme shortage of dollars and many of our lending agencies are questioning whether they will be able to supply credit to their steady customers. How much risk can an individual farmer expect on his own?

5. As land in our county is gaining an ever increasing value. To what extent can a farmer risk loss of his farm?

Your Haldimand County Federation has set up the following Insurance Committee with terms of reference; Ken Anderson, Ray Cowie, Andy Dashner, Grant Temple, Co-Op Chairman.

The Insurance Committee shall concern itself with all types of insurance particularly that which involves rural people. This shall include crop insurance, unemployment insurance, Workmen's Compensation, Canada Pension Plan, auto, and farm liability.

When it is questioned what are some of the things the Federation, has done. Certainly C.I.A.G. is one of many important contributions that could be pointed out. As it is the farmers insurance company founded within the farmers organization. Therefore the insurance committee shall work with the C.I.A.G. staff in the county and C.I.A.G. underwriters to assist in the promotion of Co-Op Insurance in the county.

At this point it might be well to mention that all insurance does not come with a premium in dollars. But in many instances is gained through taking time to gather all facts regarding a situation.

It has been brought to the attention of this office, that some farmers selling their farms and certainly there has been a lot of this

activity in our county of late. And having problems with such things as gas wells etc. in providing clear title to the property.

The Federation of Agriculture has found that these matters can be fairly and lawfully evaluated, and further recommends that the farmers make sure all facts are clear before they sign any dotted line.

In finding answers to any questions that might come to mind through reading this column, it is strongly recommended that the Haldimand Farmers approach their Lawyer, their insurance agent or contact their Federation Office in Jarvis.

As an insurance in the future of agriculture take note of a statement of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture President Mr. Gordon L. Hill, "The individual farmer must accept the responsibility of setting agricultural policy in the future, for both the O.F.A. and agriculture as a whole."
