

Farm Safety Council Annual Meeting

"Protect Our Farmers of Tomorrow - Today!" That's the theme for this year's Ontario Farm Safety Conference which will be held at War Memorial Hall, University of Guelph, from Feb. 2 to 4.

In support of this theme, this twelfth annual conference lists three main objectives: the focusing of attention on human and property losses from accidents; the mobilization of effective public support for the reduction of these losses; and, the encouragement of county and district farm safety councils to develop and continue effective farm accident prevention programs.

The conference program is a varied and comprehensive one. Feb. 2 will be the registration date for conference delegates. On Feb. 3, the executive of the Council will be elected. Mr. Glen Robertson, Chairman of the Council will chair proceedings on this day.

Featured on Tuesday will be the keynote address by Mr. Norman H. Bell, President of the Canada Safety Council and also of the White Motor Company. Also highlighted will be "The Challenge of Involvement," a speech on effective communications by Mr. Victor Morrow, Program Coordinator for the Rural Learning Association.

The Ontario Safety League will discuss its 'Defensive Driving Course' under Mr. C. Hancock, course supervisor.

The conference banquet will be held on the Tuesday evening. The Hon. William A. Stewart, Minister of Agriculture and Food, will welcome delegates. Guest speaker will be Mr. Arlie Dunlop, Q.C. of Durham.

Industry Safety Standards will be discussed on Feb. 4 by Mr. John Zich of the Ford Motor Company, Mich. Mr. John Moles, Manager of Farm Sales for the Ontario Hydro, will also deliver an address entitled 'Master or Servant.'

To conclude the discussions, Mrs. Austin Zoeller, President of the Women's Institutes of Ontario, will outline the F.W.I.O. safety programs, and O.P.P. Constable Harold Tighe will discuss safety regulations, particularly new ones recently in effect.

In addition to the program there will be a number of social events including a dance, films, and tours. Further details on the conference can be obtained by contacting Mr. Hal Wright, Secretary Manager of the Farm Safety Council, School of Agricultural Engineering, University of Guelph.

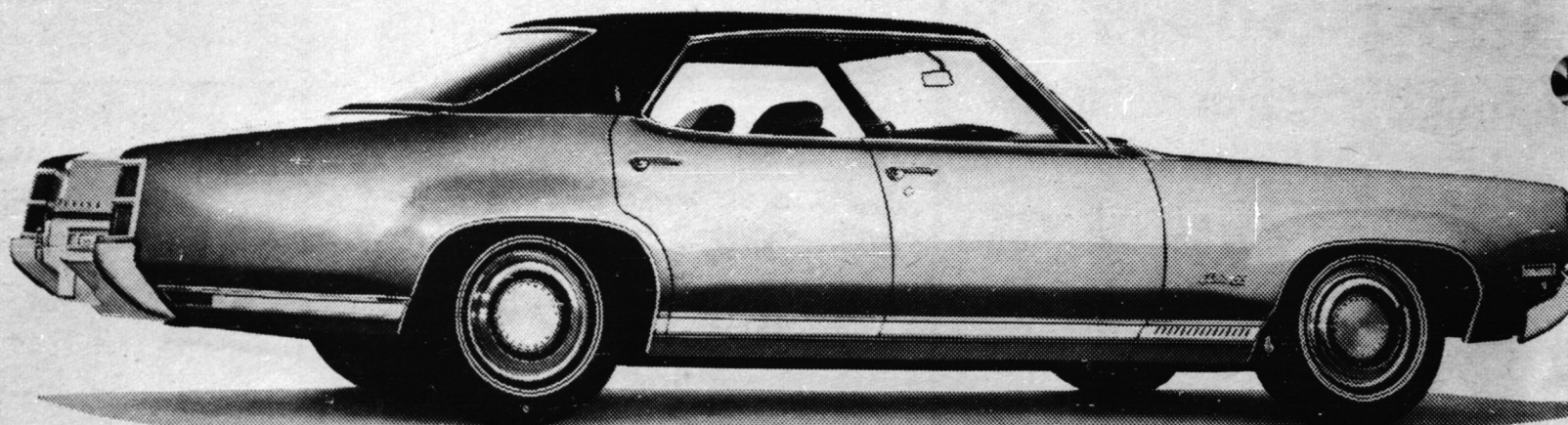

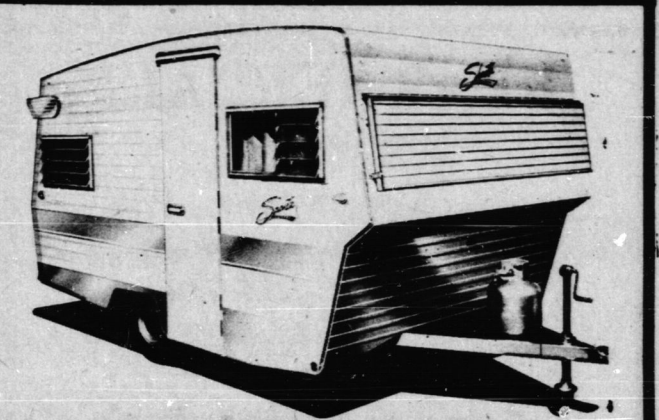
