





Fund Raising Drive Starts For Centre

SIMCOE - A public fund-raising campaign to complete financing of an area Recreation Centre will open Friday, January 30, Chairman Wally Anderson announced last week.

The objective of the drive will be to reach the goal of \$845,000 by the end of February.

The building fund has

already received widespread support from community organizations, labor, business and individuals in the district, Mr. Anderson said.

"The Simcoe Lions Club gave our campaign a terrific boost with its pledge of \$75,000 to the centre and other substantial commitments are

imminent", Mr. Anderson said.

The centre will be located at the fairgrounds in Simcoe on two acres of land donated by the Norfolk Agricultural Society. Spacious parking and increased use of the fairgrounds property and buildings were major considerations in the choice of this site.

Canadian 4H Council

C. L. Usher, Edmonton, President of the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs, today announced the establishment of the Canadian 4-H Foundation.

In making the announcement, Mr. Usher stated that the main purpose of the Foundation is to ensure that funds would be continually available for future development of programs, facilities and other opportunities for Canadian youth involved in 4-H.

Contributions in the form of gifts, bequests, and grants of property will be accepted.

Eleven directors have been appointed to the newly-formed Foundation and the first meeting of the Board will be held in Ottawa on Feb. 26.

Headquarters of the Foundation will be at 185 Somerset Street West, Ottawa, also the headquarters of the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs.

The Canadian Council of 4-H Clubs was formed in 1931 and is maintained through the leadership and financial support of agricultural organizations, business companies and governments, federal and provincial.

It has been the mainstay of a steady and progressive development in Canada's 4-H movement and has been responsible for the development and administration of programs at the national level.

Municipalities To Collect Taxes Twice Yearly

West Haldimand area municipalities will stay on a twice a year tax collection basis despite quarterly payments to the Haldimand Board of Education. This was shown today in an exclusive Record survey of area municipal clerks.

Robert Lysch, Clerk-Treasurer for Jarvis, told The Record that so far there has been no sign of a change in the number of times for collection of taxes here.

He said there could be some difference in the amount of money that the village will pay the board of education if it has to borrow the money from the bank to meet the payments. Dave Wilson, Clerk-Treasurer of Walpole, said a special sinking fund devised to pay the education levy will save the township interest money when making four payments to the education board.

"The sinking fund method was accepted by the Ontario Municipal Affairs

Department although it was questioned." He said that the decision to have a sinking fund to pay the levy was typed on the tax assessment notices sent out to ratepayers.

He said all municipalities have the right to establish such a sinking fund but it has to be for a certain purpose and approved by the department.

"Our office will continue to collect the taxes twice yearly", he said.

Arthur A. Roth, Clerk-Treasurer of Hagersville, contended that the whole method will be taken over by regional government.

He said there is a possibility that Hagersville will start collecting taxes four times yearly to avoid paying extra interest at the bank when borrowing money to pay the board of education's quarterly payments.

"I think that what would help the municipalities in the county, however, would be to extend by at least a month the first quarterly payment."

This certainly would help because it is no problem to make the last two payments", he said.

Mr. Roth also said the pro and cons of collecting taxes in the village four times yearly depend on the economics of the cost to collect the money compared with the interest cost of borrowing money to make the payment.

He said that some municipalities have even started a collection scheme of six times yearly.

"This type of collection, however, requires some sophisticated machinery and a change in the entire system", said Mr. Roth.
