Cayuga United Church Women

The Cayuga United Church Women, met in the United Church parlour on June 15. The president, Miss M. L. Douglas opened the meeting with prayer. Twenty-three members and four visitors were present. The minutes and the report of the visiting committee, were read. The date set for the Senior Citizens picnic, is July 14. It was decided to hold a Bazaar on Saturday November 28.

Mrs. Weylie, Mrs. Hedley, Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Winger were in charge of the program. The topic was "The Canadian Indian." Interesting stories were read, explaining the problems of the Canadian Indian, his loyalties to his ancestors, and his hopes for the future. All that is asked for is fair play, as their young people try to learn the skills of other Canadians with friendship and equality, which is the right of all God's Children.

The meeting closed with prayer. A social time was enjoyed, while a delicious lunch was served.

On Sunday this reader took a walk up to the Court House Park to visit the log cabin and museum. We learned something of the history of the log cabin. It was built about 1818 (there were no deeds in those days) by the family of John Wintermute, patented in 1837. It overlooked what is now highway 6 near Caledonia.

It was in danger of being demolished in 1960 by road expansion. The Haldimand Historical Society, in their wisdom, purchased it, dismantled it and rebuilt it here in the park, intact except for a new roof. The work of restoration, went on from April-60 to Sept.-60.

Mrs. Dorothy Parsons gave us an account of the Historical Articles in the Cabin, and noted they were all from the County of Haldimand.

My ancestors, brave souls they were, the Wintermutes and others faced a strange new world, with nothing but a promise from the British Government. If they did well they could become a landowner, and that was really something, when you ponder the England of those days, if you were not a landowner, (and few were), you were nothing better than a Serf. Quite often the Tenant went as chattels, with the property, in an exchange of ownership.

I recall as a small child one of my great Uncles, showing me the scroll on which the document was written, transferring a tract of Crown Land, in Burlington, P.E. Island, to one Jonathan Adams. (It would be in the early eighteen hundreds.) I remember when my Uncle rolled the scroll up, it sort of cracked and he tied it with the same piece of yellowed cord.

We went next over to the Museum in the Court House and here again a place drenched in history. There was one item, Mrs. Parsons Curator, took great pains to explain, the Speakers Chair from the Ontario Legislature at Queen's Park, donated by Mrs. Ed. Davis (Susan Baxter) in memory of her father Senator Baxter, who was Speaker of the House from 1887 to 1891. The ornate wood carving on the chair was something to behold.

A point of interest: The Chair goes to Dunnville in July, to be recovered, in the original Antique Leather.

I think it would be timely to say a word of thanks, to those kindly, farsighted people who made all this possible, so people like myself, could spend a couple of quiet hours of a Sunday afternoon; browsing through relics from past History of this County.

Freezing Strawberries

The variety of strawberry to be frozen is important since some varieties freeze much better than others. Home economists, Macdonald Institute, University of Guelph, suggest early berries like Cavalier and Grenadier, or later ones like Guardsman or Sparkle. For best buys for freezing, buy in quantity and at the peak of the berry season.

Strawberries may be frozen with or without sweetening. Sugar or sugar syrups, however, help maintain and enhance both color and flavor. Plan to freeze only an amount that can be used within the year. Any storage period longer than 12 months means gradual loss of quality.

Quick freezing at 0 degrees F. or lower gives the best results.

Menu Of Week

Mixed Sausage Grill, Fresh Beet Salad*, Parsied Potatoes, Peach Melba.

Fresh local salad vegetables are a highlight of these early weeks of summer, reminds the Food Council, Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food. Take full advantage of the cabbage, radishes, green onions, lettuce, and tender young beans appearing on the market now in increasing abundance — and serve a different combination of fresh, crisp vegetables with every meal.

Fresh Beet Salad* — Onion Dressing: 1 cup salad oil, ¼ to 1/3 cup vinegar (to taste), 1 tsp salt, ¼ tsp pepper, ½ tsp dry mustard, 1 medium-size onion, 5 or 6 whole cloves.

1. Stud onion with cloves. Bake at 350 degrees F. until onion is tender. Cool. Remove and discard cloves. Chop onion fine.

2. Thoroughly mix oil, vinegar, salt, pepper, dry mustard, and chopped onion.

3. Shake well before serving.

Salad: 3 cups cooked fresh beets cut in julienne strips, 1 hard-cooked egg, finely chopped, onion dressing, lettuce leaves.

1. Toss beets and egg with onion dressing to coat thoroughly.

2. Serve on crisp lettuce leaves.
