Tax Campaign Gaining Momentum

The tax withholding campaign is gathering strength, with rapidly increasing support from both urban and rural taxpayers. The Ontario Federation of Agriculture

has called on all owners of real property, whether farms or urban homes, to join the move to persuade the government to bring in the needed changes. The property tax system is archaic and unfair. The

government has agreed there should be a change, but there has been no action. The government is trying to drive a wedge between taxpayers. There have been rumours that they have offered the farmers a short-term crumb without making any open proposals to resolve the basic faults in the tax system, said Gordon Hill, Ontario Federation of Agriculture president, at a meeting of the OFA in Toronto recently.

The Federation is calling for the cost of education to be paid for out of provincial funds. These provincial tax revenues increase each year by \$200 to \$350 million. This tax revenue increase comes as a result of natural growth in the economy of the province. The cost of education could come out of this natural growth. The change could be phased in over the next two or three years.

"We want a definite and complete program with clearly stated dates by which changes would be implemented. Taxes on property do not reflect ability to pay. They are grossly unfair. All property owners have a stake in this fight and they should let their government know by telling them now and withholding their taxes in the fall," concluded Mr. Hill. New companies included in the listing employ at least 10 persons, occupy 5,000 square feet of manufacturing or assembly space, or have sales exceeding \$100,000 annually.

Plants To Lower Pollution

YUGA - Pollution of Grand River by the outfalls of Cayuga Dunnville will cease in near future when two sewage treatment plants will come into operation.

Plans in both places will complete within the future The Record has learned.

The official opening of \$1,175,000 plant is

scheduled for Aug. 28.

Cayuga's contract for an oxidation ditch system has been awarded to Maple Engineering and Construction Co. Ltd., of Rexdale in the amount of \$228,138.

The construction of the system is scheduled to start this fall. The village now has septic tanks.

The Haldimand-Norfolk health unit in the next four

Driver Remanded

BRANTFORD (CP) - A Powless, 26, of Haldimand, was remanded Aug. 10 when he appeared in provincial court on charges of dangerous driving and to remain at the scene of an accident.

Powless was charged in connection with a traffic accident Sunday at the Six Nations Indian reserve which claimed five lives and injured two other persons. He was set at \$500 cash and \$1,000 personal

recognizance bond.

Dead as a result of the accident are provincial police constable Stefan N. Schultz, 38, of Brantford; Sharon Henry, 20, Russell General, 39, Willard General, 34, and Vera, Antone, 33, all of Haldimand.

Ronald Hardman, 34, of Brantford, a probationary police constable, is in poor condition in hospital. Robert Montour of Haldimand was treated in hospital and released.
