### MUSIC A NECESSITY

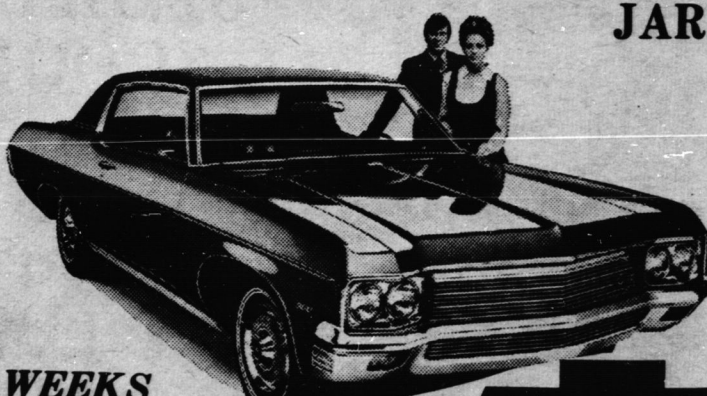

## Shearing Hedges

Second shearing of formal deciduous hedges should be done now, say horticulturists with the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food. If possible, shearing should be done during a period of dull weather, so that the freshly-cut tips aren't burnt by bright sunshine.

The best way to ensure level trimming is to stretch a cord along the hedge at the desired height. Care should be taken to shear indentations only lightly so that they can grow out to the level of the rest of the hedge. The sides should also be trimmed to maintain even growth.

The best shape for a hedge is somewhat wider at the base than at the top. If the hedge base becomes narrower than the top, not enough light gets through for proper basal growth. This usually results in a hedge that is thick at the top, but gradually becoming sparse and open near the base.

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## Teatime Topics

There are many ways you can serve coffee cold this summer, as a snack, as a pleasantly different way to finish a meal.

If the recipe specifies strong coffee, brew it with two level tablespoons of ground coffee to six ounces of water. If it says extra-strength, use two tablespoons for four ounces of water. The Pan-American Coffee Bureau recommends using the drip method for its recipes.

For a diet cooler, try mixing one cup extra-strength coffee, one cup ice and sugar or artificial sweetener to taste. Whip it in a blender at high speed until foamy. Serve in tall glasses. Serves two.

A cafe chocomalt calls for: one cup cold strong coffee, one cup milk, one cup chocolate ice cream, two tablespoons sugar, three tablespoons malted milk powder.

Mix all ingredients in a blender at high speed. Serve in tall glasses. Serves two.

A variation is a mocha frosted. You need: two and one-half cups cold strong coffee, five tablespoons chocolate, two cups vanilla ice cream.

Place all ingredients in bowl and blend with rotary beater or wire whip or in blender until smooth. Pour into tall glasses. Serves four.

A banana shake is made with one and one-half cups cold strong coffee, three tablespoons sugar, one banana, one cup vanilla ice cream.

Cut banana in chunks and combine with coffee and sugar in blender at high speed. When mixture is smooth, add ice cream and blend at medium speed until smooth. Serves two.

Cafe banana is made with two cups cold strong coffee, one banana, one cup crushed or chopped ice, two tablespoons sugar, one cup

coffee ice cream, one-quarter cup rum.

Cut banana in chunks and combine with other ingredients in blender. Whip at high speed until smooth. Pour into tall glasses. Serves three.

Try a frosty orange for breakfast. You need: one cup cold strong coffee, one cup milk, one cup orange juice, three tablespoons sugar.

Mix all ingredients in blender at high speed. Garnish with orange slices.

Spiced iced coffee is a lighter treat. It calls for: eight cups coffee, one whole cinnamon stick, eight whole cloves, sugar to taste, cream.

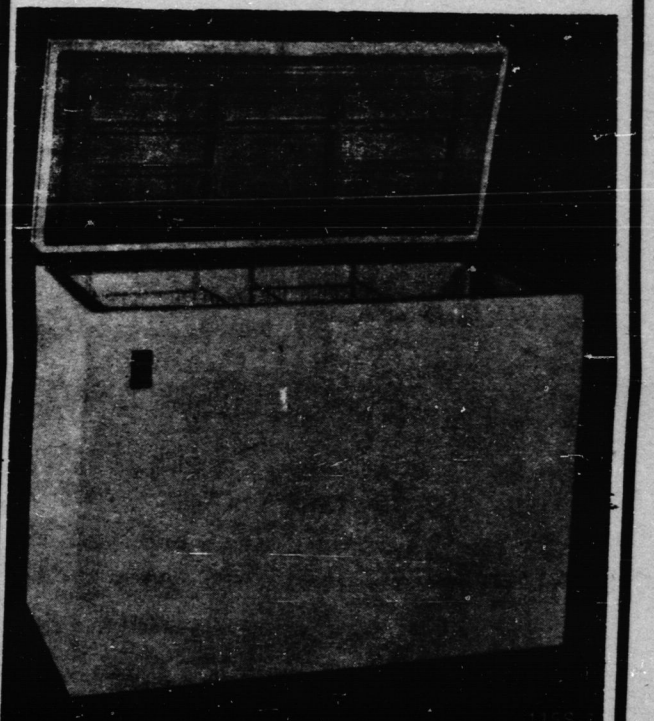
Brew eight cups coffee using three level tablespoons of coffee per cup. When coffee is brewed add cinnamon and cloves. Allow to cool, then refrigerate until chilled. Put ice cubes in tall glasses and strain coffee over the ice. Pour cream into the coffee just before serving. Serve with sugar. Serves six.
