Chinese Suffered

CALGARY (CP) Chinese settlers coming to Canada in 1914 often suffered under the immigration laws of that time, an old record shows.

A collection of 300 letters written in 1914 by the Chinese consul has been donated to the Glenbow Alberta Institute. It gives a contemporary view of the era and a graphic picture of the sufferings imposed by the head tax, a museum spokesman said.

The \$500 head tax, imposed to deter Chinese from immigrating to Canada, often had tragic results, the letters say. Ship captains in Chinese ports extolled the virtues of Canada to attract paying passengers. Then many immigrants had to use their entire savings to pay the tax.

on top of their passage and were unable to get a start when they arrived.

Most Chinese communities cared for the new immigrants and rarely asked for outside assistance. But some appeals, especially for of the tax, were sent through the consul in Vancouver.

Copies of the letters, bound in a book, were found in a building being demolished in Vancouver. The copies are in a form that pre-dates carbon paper.

After each letter was written, it was sandwiched between tissue pages of the letter book, together with a damp blotter, and placed under a press. Ink from the letter was transferred to the tissue sheets to make a copy. The original, unaffected by the copy process, was then mailed.

"I think it's possible to love every child," she said. "Sometimes it takes a long time, but you love people for themselves, not for how they behave."

Teachers like Mrs. Forsythe have always shown affection to the children, said Mr. Montgomerie. What did make it a matter of school policy, breaking down the old professional barrier that it's a mistake to get too involved with the children.

Reserve teacher Candy Chung said she felt "there were horrible risks in becoming totally involved." Mr. Montgomerie said: "When you get involved and the kid doesn't make it, you feel you've failed."

"But you've got to learn from the experience, and if you learned something, it isn't a failure."

Dorothy Hart, school guidance counsellor, said: "It was the first time I'd ever heard a principal come out with a real, loving, Christian, charitable attitude."

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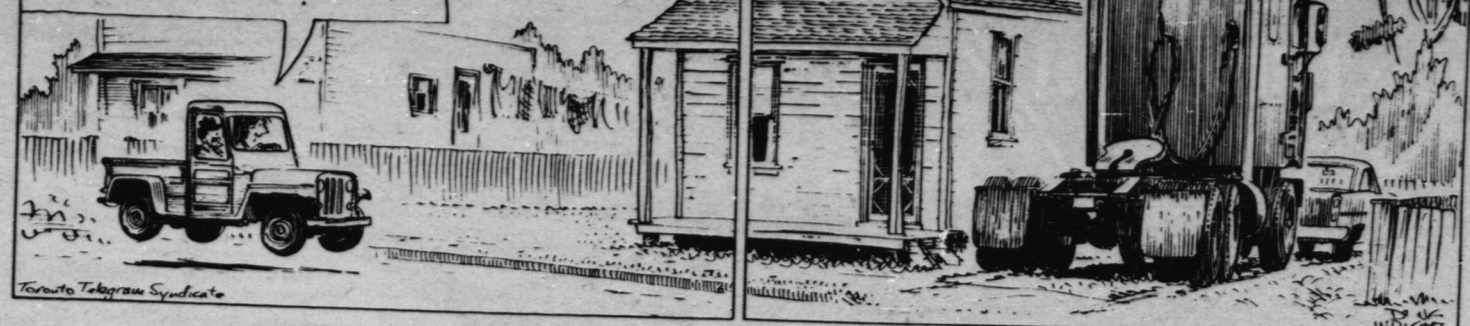

Unique Experiment

TORONTO (CP)—The Flemington Road public school in North York has become known as 'the hugging school', thanks to a unique experiment.

It began last September when Principal Jim Montgomerie gave instructions for teachers to show warmth, love and understanding to the children.

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Mr. Randall said that Ontario further expanded its industrial capability during the year with 145 companies completing licensing arrangements with foreign and Canadian firms to manufacture new products or adopt new processes.

"While the increase in total Canadian exports in 1969 was 9.5 per cent higher than in the previous year, Ontario's gain was more than 14 per cent," the minister said. "Ontario's main export increase was again in manufacturing. The province's total of \$6,800,000,000 in exports during the year represented some 46 per cent of all Canadian exports."

Mr. Randall said that 188 Ontario companies took part in sales missions sponsored by the department during the year, resulting in an estimated \$26,000,000 in new export orders. Total export sales since the trade mission program began in October 1962 are estimated at \$244,000,000, he added.

municipality's limits. OMB will decide on the basis of the hearing if it will approve.

Another dilemma facing the council is a proposed water reservoir that is intended to handle peak water using periods and any extra water use because of expansion of the village.

The village estimated the cost of the water reservoir would be some \$65,000 but when tenders for the project were opened it was learned the lowest bidder was near the \$100,000 mark.

Village councillors maintain the village cannot afford the price. However, there is a possibility the village can get another bidder closer to the original estimate.

Ron Pettitt, presently located in Newmarket, will be located in North Bay and will be Area Fieldman for the area formerly supervised by Mr. Derry.
