## Business Good At Haldimand Resort Areas

The pollution scare which has been greatly publicized during the past several months, strikes and tight money have contributed to a decline in business at many resort areas.

However, Haldimand resort areas report that business is good and that the tourist influx is on a par with that of last year.

This is in sharp contrast to other resort areas in close proximity, such as Turkey Point and Long Point Beach, where reports have been received from those engaged in the tourist industry that business has declined as compared to last year.

Miss Margaret Bagley, who assists in the operation

of the Woodlawn General Store, stated that business has been excellent to date and that the extra trade afforded by workers at the hydro project has been an added bonus.

Peacock Point resort area also reports a brisk business from campers, tourists and summer cottagers.

A great number of summer visitors at the local resort areas come from Hamilton and area.

As one Hamilton vacationer said "It's only a short drive from home and in no time at all we are here enjoying the fresh cool breeze at the beach, no wonder this is our favourite resort area."

## Five Chain Saws And Cash Taken

A break-in at the establishment of Doughty and Williamson, local dealers in agricultural implements and parts, resulted in the loss of five chain saws, valued at approximately \$1,000, and a small amount of cash.

Miss Judy Doughty said that the break-in occurred on

Monday night, July 27, and the entry was made by forcing open a side window of the building.

The loss reported is approximate as a complete inventory has not yet been concluded.

The robbery is being investigated by OPP of Cayuga.

## Water Rates Revised

Hagersville Town Council has a serious look at its water and sewer rates. It decided that a more involved research should be done before the next regular meeting. Council will then decide if increases of 12½ cent in rates will be published.

So far, the water rates have been revised three times since the original rates were established in 1963. Hagersville water rates are divided up so that rates

are charged under a flat rate system with a complicated compensation for widows, pensioners and businesses not using equal quantities of water or having fewer people employed.

The question of simplifying the system to a commercial and residential rate, and revising all of the billings will be discussed at the meeting. The metering of all businesses and residential homes involves too high a cost and

conversion would not make it a profitable system to the town, was the decision of Council.

In other business, Council sent a bill to Oneida Township for \$28,000 for an additional water supply transported when the Hagersville Fire Department answered a call in that township. Four townships are serviced by the Fire Department.

Council learned that the original estimated cost of the water tank of \$9,000 to

\$10,000 was increased to \$13,500 with the engineers estimate.

## One Excavation Only

CAYUGA — Albert J. Seemiller, clerk-treasurer of the village of Cayuga, stated that the sewer construction project is progressing very well and that one mile of construction has been completed to date.

The sewer construction including sewage disposal plant is approximately \$763,000. Completion target date

for the sewer construction is December 25, 1970.

When questioned about the possibility of there being more than one excavation of the road path of the sewer construction, Mr. Kee stated that there would be only one excavation.

Seemiller Limited, of Kitchener, has the contract for construction of the sewer project.

## Order Has Little Effect

George Mackie, construction manager at the Nanticoke development, recently stated that a "work to rule" order from Local 100 of the Canadian Union of Public Employees is having little or no effect in the Nanticoke power development.

The "work to rule" order calls working according to rule book set down by

Hydro management which in turn has a tendency to slow down work output.

The directive was issued to 11,200 Ontario members of CUPE on July 22 and could eventually lead to a general strike in August.

It is reported that out of approximately 2,000 employees at the project less than 100 are in the CUPE.
