

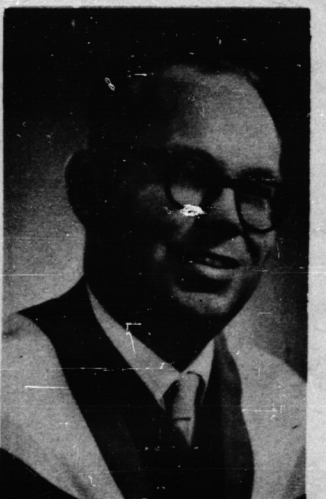
Get Degrees

Any surface mold does not harm cheese and can be scraped or cut from the cheese. Scraps of cheese which have become dry and hard can be grated and stored in a covered jar in the refrigerator.

Ripened cheese is best when served at room temperature. It should be removed from the refrigerator an hour or two before serving.

If cheese is to be kept for several weeks it can be frozen. Some soft cheeses like Camembert or strong-flavored cheeses like Limburger or Parmesan will keep successfully for about one month at 0 degrees F. Firm cheeses like Cheddar, Mozzarella, Swiss or Gouda will keep up to six months. Cream and cottage cheeses do not freeze well.

Cheese Storage

All cheeses require refrigeration to maintain top quality. The soft, unripened cheeses, such as cottage and cream, are quite perishable and should be used within a few days. Ripened cheeses keep well under refrigeration, but must be wrapped tightly in the original wrapper or aluminum foil to protect them from drying out and picking up off-flavors from other food.
