
Thirteen motor vehicle collisions were investigated resulting in injuries sustained to five persons.


common on the large branches. A positive diagnosis can be made only by isolations from the infected wood.

Trees showing severe infection cannot be saved and should be removed. New broad-leaf trees should not be planted in the same spot unless fresh soil is used. Trees recently infected, and showing wilt on only a few branches, can

sometimes be saved by liberal applications of a high nitrogen soluble fertilizer early in the growing season. If the fertilizer is applied too late the tree will die from winter injury. Any tools used for pruning should be disinfected by

wiping with rubbing alcohol. Dr. Busch noted that sugar maple is also susceptible to this disease but that fewer specimens had been tested for Verticillium.

The regular meeting of Jarvis Lions Club on June 8 was well attended as usual.


