Twister Hits Near Hagersville

A twister made a visit to the area when it invaded the property of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Helder last Thursday.

The two had been out visiting friends and on their

return home they found trees uprooted on their property on the Town Line just west of Hagersville.

Three healthy trees had been completely uprooted from the ground in their

back yard. It is believed the twister originated from a thunder storm that passed through the area Thursday afternoon. Each of the trees ranged in height from 75 to 100 feet. When they were

uprooted they narrowly missed hitting a car that was parked near Helder's barn.

Mrs. Helder told The Record that a back porch door was also torn off as well as several screens on the house.

A large iron watering trough was thrown from one end of the farm's pasture to the other. A lawn mower that was near one of the uprooted trees wasn't moved, she said.

Renovation Plans For Jarvis School

The Haldimand Board of Education plans to make renovations to the Jarvis Public School.

This was the decision at a board meeting Tuesday.

The renovations will include building a supply storage room and girl's washroom in the basement of the school; relocate the Principal's office from the present location to the former storage and library area; cut a new passage door for the basement between the corridors and remove three existing windows and block up with masonry. It was also decided to apply fireproof paint to the kindergarten ceiling.

The Board also:

— Viewed three films that were entered in a student competition for Ontario. The three schools entered are Canborough, Caledonia High School and Dunnville Public School. The films were made by Grade 8 and 9 students.

— Decided to offer 7.2 acres — the former site and building of the Hagersville High School — for sale.

— Advised by the Haldimand-Norfolk Medical

Officer of Health that its water and sewage facilities at the Anna Melick School are not up to standards and will have to be fixed before the school reopens in September.

— The board decided the property committee should hold a meeting with board of health officials for a clarification of the report before any action is taken.

— Decided to install a new lift pump to correct a septic tank problem that was

brought to the board's attention by the board of health.

— Decided on new contracts for bus operators. A bus with 61 passengers or under will receive \$2,700 plus 25 cents a mile; buses 61 to 67 passengers will receive \$2,800 plus 26 cents a mile; buses over 67 passengers \$2,900 plus 27 cents a mile and the minimum will be 48 cents and the maximum 60 cents a mile.

Bylaw Amended

PORT DOVER — Council amended a bylaw to allow a later closing hour at its meeting Monday.

The hours were extended from a 1 a.m. closing for restaurants to 2 a.m.

Coun. Larry Woods voted in opposition to the amendment. He said his reason was that "other communities have had a lot of trouble from youths of questionable character. This trouble usually takes place late at night."

In other business council granted the Horticultural Society \$150.

Chief John Forbes, in his report to council, said there had been a substantial increase in the number of complaints for the month. This was because of a large influx of people, both transients and tourists.

Council agreed to see that a water pipe leak on George St. is fixed.

Fred Knetchtel of Market St. said the pipe had been leaking since 1963.

Turnabout Decision On 'Bricking'

CAYUGA — The federal government did a turn about in a decision for the design of a new post office for here after a protest by council.

Village council had been shown blueprints and drawings for a modern brick structure when the project was first unveiled but learned

the government had then decided to build a less attractive wooden structure instead.

After council's protest about the change to a wooden structure a department of public works spokesman said that plans would be changed again and the building would have brick construction.

The new building will be located on the corner of King and Cayuga Sts. Ally Construction Co. Ltd. of Toronto has been awarded a contract of \$42,900 to construct the building.

Local Youth Killed

CAYUGA — A district teenager was killed early Monday in a car truck crash near here.

Dead is James Roadhouse, 18, of Route One, Cayuga.

Roadhouse was the lone occupant of a car which collided with a tractor trailer unit driven by William Ross Lockie, 33, of Dunnville, who escaped injuries.

The accident occurred at highway 3, at Canboro at 6:30 a.m. and was investigated by the Cayuga Detachment of the O.P.P. who estimated the total damage at \$850.

The traffic fatality count for Haldimand County now (June 15) stands at eight.

'Hoot And Away'

An owl didn't give a hoot about attending a Hamilton Presbytery meeting held in Knox Presbyterian Church in Jarvis Tuesday.

The bird had been haunting the church since last Thursday living off flies and bugs and other creatures that live in the church.

However, when the night session was about to start of the presbytery council the owl landed on the back of the chair. One of the members tried to catch the owl but it managed to escape and find its way out the door.
