Horticultural Station Officially Opened

SIMCOE — A new horticultural station four miles east of here was officially opened Friday.

James Allan, MPP for Haldimand-Norfolk, officially unveiled the new station, which will house some 150 people attending the ceremonies.

The \$675,000 structure was designed by the architect firm of Smale-Dickson and is now the headquarters of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food.

He said the resources we work with in horticulture are the soil, this climate, the growers and now the laboratory the station provides.

"Our soil resources are the sands and clays located on this station, which are typical of a narrow belt of similar soil stretching from Lake Erie to Georgian Bay."

Other guests at the ceremony were Dr. D. N. Huntley, director of agricultural education and research division of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food; Blake Lefler, reeve Township of Townsend; Donald L. Murphy, warden Norfolk County and William Knowles, MPP Norfolk-Haldimand.

Seat Belts — Dual Brakes Jury Recommendation

NORWICH — Seat belts and dual brake systems should be mandatory in all school buses was an all male jury's recommendation at the inquiry of a fatal school bus accident.

The inquest was held to investigate the death of Margaret Vriends, 13, of R.R.3, Delhi, who died in a bus-tractor trailer crash at the intersection of Highway 59 and Con. 11 of South Norwich Township May 26.

A second girl, Violet Beselnyodi, 11, also died two days after the crash.

A garage mechanic testified that a bearing failed which was the cause of brake failure.

The bus was owned by the Haldimand-Norfolk Roman Catholic School Board. The passengers were students of Our Lady of Fatima School, Courtland.

Propose Rigid Hunting Regulations

CAYUGA — Haldimand County Council in a review of its hunting laws discovered it hasn't visited the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests protesting destruction by hunters as it promised to do.

The council was supposed to present stiffer hunting regulations for the county. These regulations were passed in December but no action has been taken as yet.

The proposed new regulations:

- Limiting non resident hunting licences to 100 instead of 200.
- Each person purchasing his own hunting licence.
- Higher penalties for ignoring no trespassing signs.
- Ask for more co-operation from police and conservation officers in enforcing no trespassing signs.
