The seasonings and the foods that you serve during the summer can be more varied than people sometimes think, says Marjorie Elwood of the Canadian spice Association.

For instance, try cooking summer squash, on your grill if you like, or indoors, but pleasantly seasoned.

For four to six servings, you need 1½ pounds of zucchini or yellow summer squash, 1 teaspoon instant minced onion, 1 teaspoon seasoned salt, ¼ teaspoon dried tarragon leaves, freshly ground pepper, ½ cup finely cut green pepper, ½ cup butter.

Wash zucchini. Cut into ½-inch pieces. Place in centre of 18-by-20-inch rectangle of heavy-duty foil. Sprinkle with next five ingredients. Dot with butter. Bring long sides of foil together. Fold over twice to seal. Fold ends over twice. Place at the edge of the grill, five inches above coals. Grill 20 minutes. Turn package with tongs and cook about 10 minutes more.

To cook indoors, combine all ingredients with ¼ cup water in a medium-size skillet. Cover and simmer over medium heat until squash is fork tender, about 10 to 15 minutes. Stir occasionally.

Try grilling fish after they have spent two hours in a seasoned marinade.

You need two pounds of fish fillets: bass, perch or pickerel.

For the marinade you need: ½ cup melted butter, ¼ cup lemon juice, ½ teaspoon seasoned salt, ½ teaspoon dried marjoram, ¼ teaspoon dry mustard, 2 teaspoons dried parsley, freshly ground black pepper.

Arrange fish in a large shallow baking dish. Combine all marinade ingredients and pour over fish. Refrigerate about two hours.

Place fillets in a well greased, hinged wire broiler. Place broiler on grill four inches above glowing coals and grill five minutes. Brush with marinade, turn and grill until fish will flake easily, about seven minutes. Brush occasionally with marinade.

A variation on mayonnaise tastes good with fish and with other dishes. You combine and chill 1 cup mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon chopped capers, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, ¼ teaspoon seasoned pepper, ¼ teaspoon celery salt.

Another accompaniment to a meal is dilled sour cream. You combine 1 cup dairy sour cream with 1 teaspoon freeze dried chopped chives, ¼ teaspoon

dried dill weed, freshly ground pepper and ¼ teaspoon worcestershire sauce. Let stand an hour before using it with boiled or baked potatoes.

Lemon butter calls for 1 cup butter and ¼ cup lemon juice beaten together. Gradually beat in ½ teaspoon onion salt, dash of cayenne pepper, and 1 tablespoon dried chopped parsley. Use it with fresh beans, peas, carrots, squash, potatoes. Lemon butter keeps well, covered and chilled.

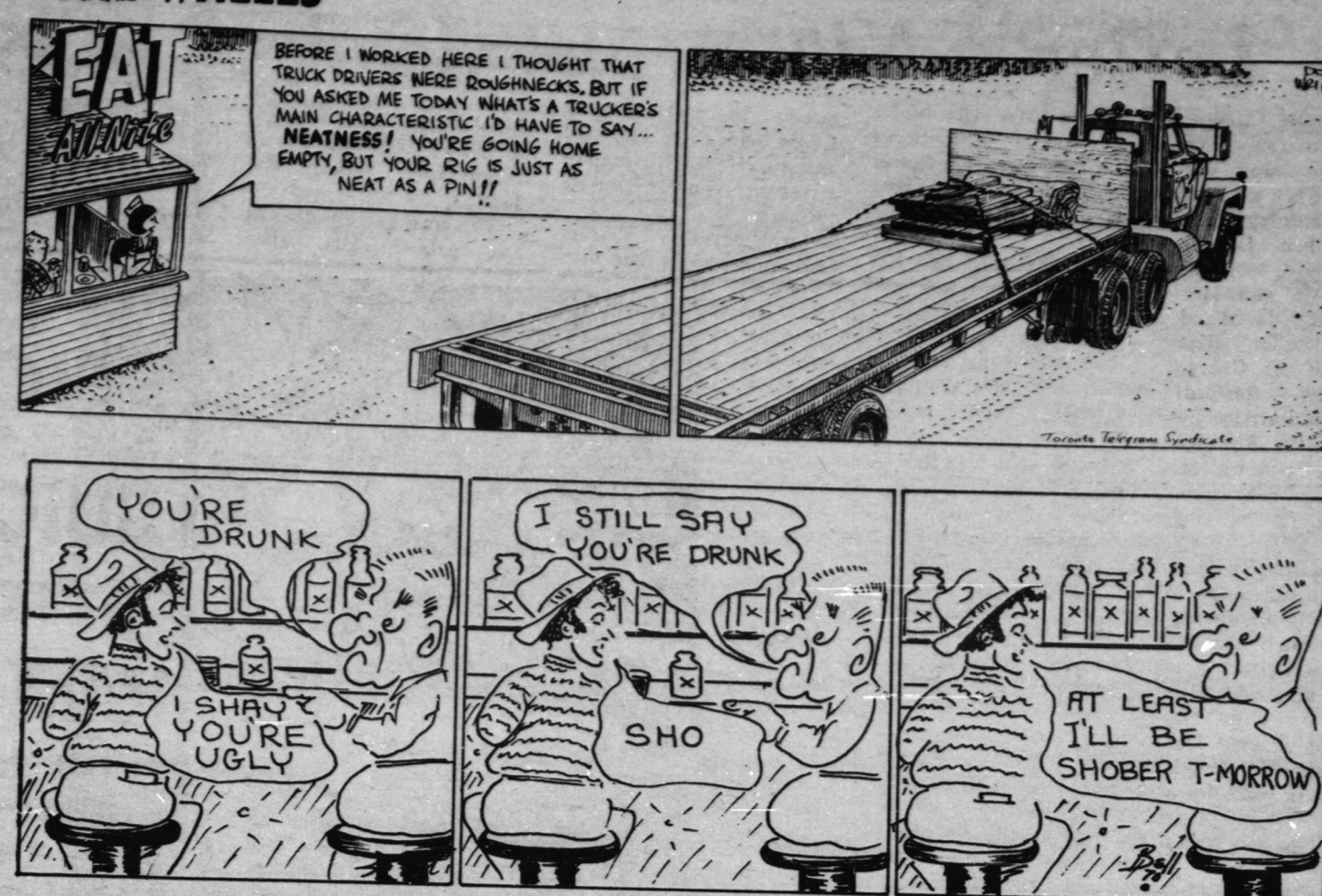
