Pancake Party

For a pancake party, here's a quick start with a mix. The homemade richness comes from the evaporated milk and the easy-to-prepare fruit syrups. Home economists, Macdonald Institute, University of Guelph, suggest serving the syrups warm by placing the filled pitchers in a pan of hot water.

Quick Pancakes — 1 cup pancake mix, ½ cup water, 1 egg, 2 tsp salad oil or melted shortening, 2/3 cup evaporated milk.

1. Combine milk, water, egg and oil in a shaker or covered jar. (If melted shortening is used, add after the pancake mix.) Add pancake mix and shake vigorously until the batter is fairly smooth.

2. Pour batter in small cakes onto hot, lightly greased griddle.

3. Turn cakes when bubbles on surface break.

4. Serve with whipped butter and warm syrups. Makes 12 small cakes.

Syrups

Blueberry Syrup — 1 one-pound can blueberries (2 cups), ½ cup light corn syrup, dash of salt.

1. With electric beater or blender, blend blueberries until smooth.

2. Pour into a small saucepan; stir in syrup and salt.

3. Bring to boiling; boil gently, uncovered, stirring constantly, five to seven minutes. Makes two cups.

Strawberry Syrup — Repeat above method using 1 10-ounce package frozen sliced strawberries, thawed.

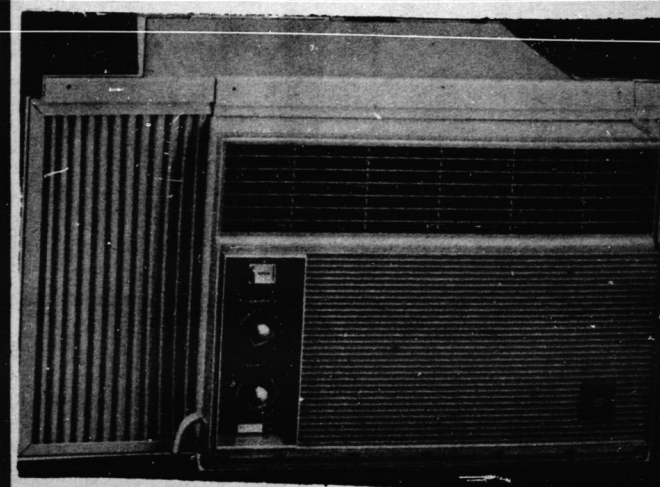

Cayuga Speedway Race Results

NELLES CORNERS, ONTARIO — Roger Treichler of N. Tonawanda NY, outcharged veteran Billy Rafter of Nia Falls, NY, in the 20 lap Modified-Sportsman Feature, Friday night, to capture his first Main event victory here at Cayuga Speedway this season. In his sizzling ride, Roger set a new track record at the fantastic speed of 105.13 mph, turning the 20 circuits in seven minutes, eight seconds, and nine 1/100ths. He broke his cousin Merv Treichler's year old record of 7:15.8, for 103.68 mph. Rafter held on to the second position at the checker, followed by Bill Brainard of Cheektawaga, NY, Roger's brother Gordy Treichler and Pete Hayes of Lockport, NY.

A six car crash on the second turn of the first lap of the Sportsman Feature put Dick Kulak and Cam Gagliardi out for the night, but the others were able to restart after fast, minor repairs to their cars. Rafter jumped to a ½ lap lead on the second start and looked like a sure winner, until Roger broke from the pack, and caught him at the half-way mark. Once Roger passed Rafter, it was all over but the shouting, as he almost flew to the checkered flag.

In the 15 lap Late-Model Feature event, Dan Skurski and Darrel Clause were the early leaders, until Jim McGraw took command on the sixth circuit. Ken Cassel brought out the caution flag when his right front wheel broke as he entered turn 1

on the next lap. Ken hit the guard rail, but was not injured. Book battled his way through traffic to blast by McGraw on lap 13, and held on for his win. McGraw took second, Jim Laughing third, Norm Forbes fourth and Ross May fifth.

Jim Dunham captured his second straight Mini-Stox Main event ahead of Doug Sutton, Wayne Pearce, Larry Anthony and Ralph Bird. In the 20 lap TQ Midget headliner, Sean Shanahan of Etobicoke, Ontario, also scored his second victory in as many weeks, with Bruce Bolitsky, Harry Macy, Sal Libatore and Hugh Armstrong following.

The Sportsman heats were taken by Brainard and Hayes, before Jim Rudolph of Ransomville, NY copped the consolation.

McGraw and Cassel scored wins in their heats, as Billy Daniels topped the consolation event in the Late-Model class.

Our June 27 meeting will comprise a Pinto line class to be judged by everyone present. The person who places the horses the same as the official judge will win a prize.

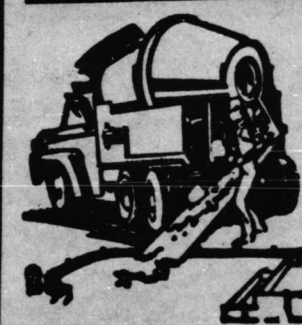

Reciepes For You

REGINA (CP) — Native people in northwestern Canada often subsist on "empty-calorie" foods, such as pre-packed cereals and processed foods, says Alice Jenner, director of the Saskatchewan public health department's nutrition division.

"They ignore the nutrition of many foods found, quite literally, in their own back yards."

Mrs. Jenner is trying to help with a booklet called Recipes for you, prepared by her department.

Probably the most significant features for native people are sections on cooking wild game and plants, and advice on how to grow and preserve local vegetables and fruits, Mrs. Jenner said.

Recipes on care and cooking of wild duck, beaver, moose, elk, rabbit, muskrat and ptarmigan are included.

Dishes such as chili con carne are adapted for game as well as domestic meats.

Use of wild vegetables is suggested, including dandelion, ferns, wild rice, wild onions and watercress.

"We also show some of the delectable dishes that can be prepared from wild fruits, such as saskatoons, blueberries, cranberries, currants and rose hips", Mrs. Jenner said.

Drawings are used throughout the book to illustrate technical points and it is filled with nutrition hints.
