TORONTO (CP) — Busy volunteers of Central Hospital have collected 1,000 books in 15 different languages for a library for newly landed immigrants with only a smattering of English or none. The 100-member Association of Central Hospital has also translated admitting questionnaires into 12 languages and is preparing translation of diet sheets.

BUGGED MOOSE
KENORA, Ont. (CP) — Six Kenora district moose have worn collars round their necks since last August. The portable radio transmitters were placed there by department of lands and forests biologists who have been able to monitor the movements of the bugged animals, locating and identifying them even though they were not actually seen.

TAKE OUT ORDER
EDMONTON (CP) — In Alberta you can purchase beer from hotels to take out. If you're caught short at a party or at home, all you have to do is nip down to the local hotel and pick up a case. There's one catch though: The price is the same as the hotel charges in its beverage room or lounge. That means a case of 12 may cost as much as \$7.80 compared to the \$2.75 in the government outlets.

RETURN TO DEPOTS
EDMONTON (CP) — Liquor, beer and wine can all be purchased in the same government stores in Alberta. There are no separate beer outlets except those of individual brewers. However, empty beer bottles on which there is a 30-cent refund, cannot be returned to the stores. They must be returned to bottle depots or picked up by brewers.

STARTS DECREASING
CALGARY (CP) — Dwelling starts in prairie urban areas — population 10,000 and over — were down to 1,262 in January, a 51.8 per cent drop from the same month a year ago. Manitoba dropped 14.2 per cent, Saskatchewan 95.8 per cent and Alberta 53.9 per cent.

BILINGUALISM PAYS
SASKATOON (CP) — It paid to be bilingual in this city recently when the post office ran out of income tax forms in English. More enterprising types dusted off their high-school French textbooks, but the shortage didn't last long, to the relief of non-French speakers.

TWO OBJECTIVES
MONTREAL (CP) — Philippe Casgrain, recently re-elected chairman of the National Theatre School for 1970, said he has two objectives — to increase the school's bursary fund and eventually install it in new, specially designed premises.
