

OPP Report

"Stopping on the highway" Motorist! Here's a reminder. If for any reason you must stop on a highway, always pull off onto the shoulder. Never stop your vehicle on the travelled portion of a highway! This is not only dangerous... it's against the law. Make sure the road is clear before you pull back on the road again. These are simple precautions, but they can help prevent collisions.

Officers patrolled a total of 7,315 miles, issued 19 warnings and 14 charges to motorists. In Provincial Judge's Court, Cayuga, Ontario, on Wednesday, March 18, 1970, 17 convictions were registered. General occurrences investigation were: one theft, four other criminal code, one assault, one liquor investigation with a charge, one charge of impaired driving, two breakins, and 17 requests for assistance.

A theft of an auto investigation from Springvale, March 19, 1970, resulted in the vehicle being recovered, abandoned and burned out, on the Indian Reserve. - Prov. Const. Schaus investigated.

Prov. Const. H. J. Bell (Safety Officer), visited two schools and presented the "Bicycle Safety" to 540 children, also showed a film to the United Church Young People's Group on March 15, 1970, and to the 4-H Junior Farmer's Group, Kohler, Ontario, on March 20, 1970.

Wheat Inventory Reduced

CHATHAM, Ontario, March 20, 1970 - The inventory of 1969 crop winter wheat owned by the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board has been reduced sharply in recent export sales.

Delegates attending a provincial wheat meeting of elected county committee men held in Toronto March 18 and 19 were advised that out of a total of three million bushels of sprouted wheat purchased by the marketing board since harvest, 2,960,000 bushels has been sold leaving 40,000 bushels on hand.

In addition, 650,000 bushels of milling quality wheat is owned by the marketing board and is being offered for export.

In a report of the purchase and sales position made by the board's marketing agent, United Co-operatives of Ontario and presented by Mr. H. H. Pitz, Chatham, the meeting was also advised it is anticipated some further small blocks of sprouted wheat will be purchased but a clean up of stocks is expected by crop year end.

Mr. Pitz also expressed doubt that any further large quantities of milling quality wheat will be offered to the board and hope is held that present stocks will also be disposed of by year end

Mrs. Bray read an article on Ireland today. Mrs. Wm. Nicol gave a talk on the many industries in Haldimand County.

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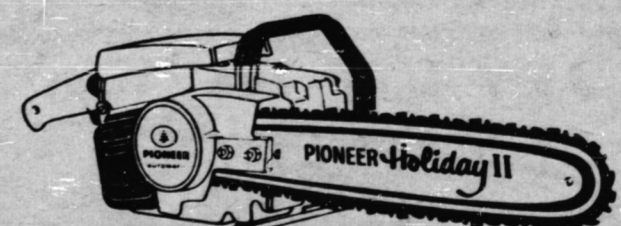
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
