Is Radar After Dark Necessary?

HAGERSVILLE Council questioned the use of radar to control traffic speed after dark Monday when it was learned it was done in the village.

It was also learned the unit purchased last year is now fully paid. Councillor Ross Slote started off the debate on the issue. He said: "In my opinion it's poor thinking to use radar after dark."

Councillor Nick Bashi argued that there was no law that prohibited the use of radar after dark. Our streets are greater in the daytime because of the children."

Council was in a dilemma to decide what was a reasonable use of radar. It was decided to ask Chief Ray Holden of Hagersville Police to attend the next meeting to explain how the radar equipment is being used by his department.

Probe Hydro Site Bird Deaths

NANTICOKE - Hydro officials are still probing the mystery of dead birds found in the proximity of the smoke stack being constructed at its new generating station here.

A hydro spokesman said the birds have been sent to the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests for analysis.

He said that there is a fear the birds may have been poisoned from rat poison being used at the construction site. However, the type being used isn't supposed to be toxic to anything but rats.

It is more likely the birds ran into the stack, which is now 635 feet high and is illuminated at night because of a federal department of transport ruling to warn aircraft. The stack will be 655 feet high when it is complete", he said.

In other business council heard Councillor Slote state that citizens were complaining about commercial vehicles being started as early as 4:30 a.m. in the village.

After checking the municipality's bylaws it was found that there was no bylaw to cover the situation. However, the council cited a bylaw that states no commercial vehicle can be parked in a residential area.

Council referred the matter to Chief Holden and asked he get information about what could be done about the matter from the Ontario Department of Transport.

Council made no decision on a query from Haldimand County Council on whether it would prefer to have a county inspector instead of the present system of a local building inspectors.
