put out to pasture, some of the areas of liability that could effect the farmer. For example, livestock wandering onto a neighbor's field could leave the owner of the animals liable for damage done to crops. The owner could be made to pay regardless of circumstances surrounding their escape from his property. In addition a farmer could be considered liable as a result of injury or property damage resulting from an automobile-animal collision if the animals wander on the road. A

possibility also arises when a farmer goes on the road with his machinery. Should he be involved in an accident he could be liable. Because of the number of idle farms in the county to-day many farmers are working additional land.

The Federation of Agriculture recommends that farmers protect themselves against these liabilities by contacting one of the county agents of C.I.A.G. (Co-operators Insurance Association, Guelph).

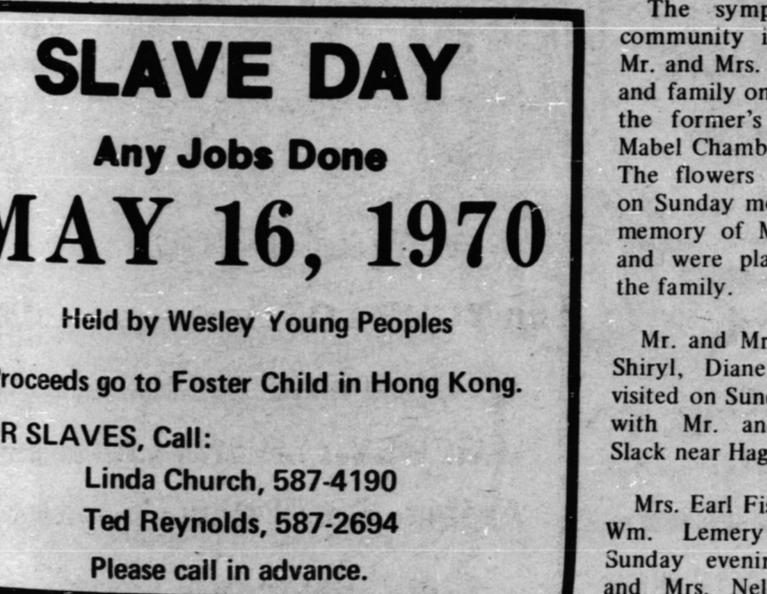

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Lands and Forests Report

Provincial Parks in the Lake Erie District are all open to the public at the present time, although portions of some are closed off due to wet conditions or development work being carried out.

Charges for entry and camping at Pinery Provincial Park are carried through on a year-round basis. Charges will commence on May 8, 1970, at Rock Point, Selkirk, Turkey Point, Long Point, Rondeau, Wheatley, Holiday Beach, and Ipperwash.

Other park areas which are open to the public free of charge, for day use at the present time, are Iroquois Beach, Port Bruce, John E. Pearce, Ipperwash Beach, and Severn.

There is no change in the fee schedule this year - Combination camping and entry permit, \$2.50/day. Combination camping and entry permit with electricity, \$3.00/day. Group camping permit for Girl Guides, Scouts, etc., 10¢/person/day. Group camping facilities are presently only available at Pinery and Rondeau Park.

Vehicle Entry Permit (Annual), \$10.00/year. This permit entitles the vehicle for which it is issued to enter any Provincial Park and parks operated by the St. Lawrence Parks Commission during the year.

Daily Vehicle Permit, \$1.00/day. Bus Vehicle Entry Permit, \$6.00/day.

DISTRICT PARK IMPROVEMENTS
 Additional facilities which have been developed during the winter are as follows:

At Pinery - one new maintenance building, a new comfort station, a picnic shelter, an addition to the Post Office, four miles of road, one mile of hydro line, electric hand dryers installed in washrooms, and improvements made to the water systems.

At Ipperwash - parking for approximately 1,000 cars is near completion, two additional change houses, concrete parking barriers will be replacing the wooden ones, electric hand dryers have been installed in the washrooms, and a new store is under construction.

At Holiday Beach - a picnic shelter, improvements to the parking lot, reconstruction of the entrance island, and electric hand dryers installed in the washrooms.

At Wheatley - two new walkways have been installed between the camping and beach areas, electric dryers have been installed in the washrooms, and additional fencing of the park boundary has been completed.

At Rondeau - electric hand dryers have been installed in the washrooms, the Assistant Superintendent's Residence completed, rental cottages have been renovated, and material is being assembled for the reconstruction of the dock this fall.

At Selkirk - the access road has been paved, 50 campsites will have electricity on them, and an interval communications system set up.

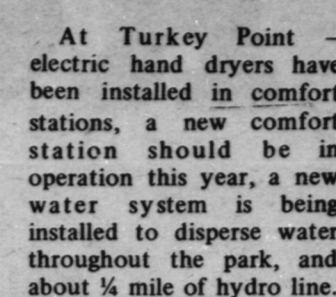
At Long Point - road paving has been completed during the past year, a new tile bed, electric hand dryers

in the comfort stations, concrete parking barriers to replace the old wooden ones, improved water supplies, and trailer electrical outlets are being installed in a portion of the new park.

At Turkey Point - electric hand dryers have been installed in comfort stations, a new comfort station should be in operation this year, a new water system is being installed to disperse water throughout the park, and about 1/4 mile of hydro line.
