Mill Rates Jump In Two Townships

Walpole mill rate will be up about 3.5 mills for farm and residential property in the township. This was the decision of council, Friday, Clerk Dave Wilson told the Record.

The biggest increase came for school boards with residential rate up 1.5 mills. The county rate is also up .63 mills. The rate was set at 96.45 mills compared with 93.067 last year.

The assessment for the township stands at \$6,570,800. The residential property tax reduction will be \$54.80 for each dwelling except where the amount is greater than 50 percent of the total tax.

Inquest Scheduled Into Crash

NORWICH - An inquest has been scheduled June 19 to inquire into the school bus crash May 28 on Highway 59.

This was announced Tuesday by Corner R. M. Hall.

The crash claimed the lives of two elementary students and sent most of the other passengers on the bus to hospital. The bus was carrying 30 passengers to Our Lady of Fatima School in Courtland.

The bus was eastbound on Con. 11 of South Norwich and hit a transport-trailer that was south bound on Highway 59.

The hearing will be held at the North Norwich Township office.

Two of the students of the 28 injured in the crash are still in hospital. Both are reported in good condition. A third was released from hospital yesterday.

The victims of the crash were Margaret Vriends, 13, and Violet Besenyodi, 12, both of R.R.3, Delhi.

WOODHOUSE TAX PORT DOVER

Woodhouse, Friday, set its new mill rate at an increase 3.82 mills for this year's property taxes.

The council will have increased expenditures of \$2,598.

The residential rate is 41.76 mills compared with 39.74 mills.

The secondary school rate is up 4.04 mills and the elementary school rate is down 2.24 mills.

The separate school rate is up 3.02 mills to this year's total rate of 41.76 mills.

Four Drivers Escape Injury

Four drivers escaped injury in two crashes Monday at the intersection of Highway 6 and the Nanticoke Sideroad.

In the first crash John Dunn Ward, 29, of Hamilton was attempting a left turn when a second car driven by Raymond Elmer Waldick crashed into the first car.

Damage was \$900 to Ward's car and \$200 to the other. Const. D. Ryan of Cayuga OPP investigated the crash reported at 5:45 p.m.

In the second crash at the intersection a car driven by George Papagianis, 34, of Brantford, and a car driven by John Stan, 17, of R.R.1, Jarvis collided.

Damage to Stan's car was \$50 and to the other \$75.

Const. W. Edge of Cayuga OPP investigated the crash reported at 2 p.m.

An Explanation About Comprehensive Health Care

Comprehensive Health Care has been described as a shopping plaza or market approach to care for the community. Comprehensive envisions all care. Do we have it? No. Are we working for it? Yes. What does it mean? It means an integrated system of care for all people. It is a system in which all the pieces fit together like a puzzle and interlocked. No one can be out of place. The Hall Royal Commission on Health Care in Canada, which published findings in 1964 urged Canada to adopt a program of comprehensive health care. The

federal-provincial hospital insurance scheme and more recently medicare have gone a long way to support such a program.

However, only two provinces have insurance to cover senior citizens and many have extended care facilities. There is much overlapping between departments of health and departments of welfare. Government has been slow to sow the seed for a social welfare insurance scheme which will provide total service for all Canadians. We still have a patchwork system, which hinders the proper development of comprehensive health care. If government is going to

assume the role of underwriting health care through various insurance schemes, the government's challenge is to provide an integrated realistic program that can be effective.

Why haven't we had this in the past? To a degree, we have but one must remember the hospital has become the centre of health care has had a long history as a charitable institution providing nursing care and relying on charitable gifts and donations from wealthy citizens, businesses and members of the community.

It has only been in the last two decades that the hospital has radically

changed its role. The advent of federal/provincial universal hospital insurance has put the hospital on a day to day operating basis.

During the same period other health systems have evolved including the public health departments, the school health programs, private practice and dentistry. The centre of health care has shifted from the doctor's office and the home to the hospital.

It is very rarely that one will find the modern doctor treating his patient in the home. Today the doctor relies on the community hospital's up-to-date equipment and facilities to help him diagnose and treat his patients.
