HAGERSVILLE - Some veterans, special guests and their wives attended the Hagersville Legion annual day.

Three members were honored with 40 year membership pins. They are Brock Mattice, Albert Brooks and Harry Cuff. Four were presented with

life memberships. They are Peter Stoddart, Gordon Birdsell, Percy MacLellan and Frank Barrett.

Rev. K. J. Mathews, former padre for the branch, told the meeting it should be all the more apparent why Canadians should remember the sacrifices made by the people fighting Canada's wars because of the recent developments in Quebec and the declaration of the War Measure Act.

He asked "How dare they embarrass the people of Canada in the eyes of the world - how dare they?"

Fire Out In Five Minutes

HAGERSVILLE - A volunteer fireman quashed a blaze in a garage on King St. Wednesday within five minutes of the alarm.

The garage was owned by Vokes, Elm St., and used as a camper.

Chief Bill McClarty of the Hagersville Fire Department said 16 men

responded to the alarm. "We used the tanker truck rather than run 700 feet of hose to a hydrant."

"This would have taken extra time and saved tying up the third truck," he said.

Three trucks responded to the call reported at 10:45 p.m.

Sewage Plant Hagersville Dilemma

HAGERSVILLE - The Village is still having problems with its sewage disposal plant. Reeve Lyle Furry told council Monday the plant wasn't working right at a regular council meeting.

"The sludge isn't digesting properly - the Ontario Water Resources Commission is aware of the problem," he said.

Coun. John Kincaid told council he blamed the engineers for the plant not functioning properly.

"We take their advice but it still doesn't work properly," he said.

Coun. Ross Slope asked: "Where do we stand - do

we just keep on paying?"

Clerk Art Roth told council it would have to pay for all the work done if it had been approved by the municipality's engineer.

"If the contractor did the work as approved by the engineer we have no come back," said Mr. Roth.

Coun. Kincaid vowed council would pay only when everything is working properly and not until then.

"It seems to me the engineer just shakes his head - A monstrosity that's what we have got," he said.

Reeve Furry added: "I think we have got to tell them that we don't think that we should have to pay

for experimentation. I think we got rid of the odor problem only to get another," he said.

In other business council heard a protest from Coun. Nick Basili about buying a property for a fire hall when the Village owns two sites that could be used.

"In my opinion we are doing the wrong thing," he said.

Coun. Slope said that according to the planning board the council can't build on the two properties it owns.

Mr. Basili said the community centre site was big enough and probably would be a good site for a fire hall.

Reeve Furry explained only an option had been placed on a new property on King St. E. (The former Tom Reid property) as a site for a new fire hall.

Council also:

* Received acknowledgment of an \$8,000 grant from Ontario to pay the remaining capital expenditure of the Hagersville Arena.

* Decided to approve a planning board request to have a public hearing in a land zoning use change from a commercial to residential.

* Decided to hold a Miss Anna Alamas night at Hagersville Presbyterian Church on Nov. 16.

* Passed a resolution to proceed with a water works and sanitary sewer project for the west section of the Village as outlined in an OWRC proposal.
