

Erie Presbyterial UCW Hold Successful Rally

Officers of Erie Presbyterial United Church Women assisted in a fall rally, under the theme "A Sit in on a Skit in," highlighting Leadership, Citizenship and Stewardship. The meeting, held in Cayuga United Church on Tuesday evening, Nov. 10, was attended by 86 delegates, representing 18 United Churches of the surrounding district.

Mrs. Keith Richardson, Area Vice President, presided for the opening exercises, which include a welcome from Miss Leona Douglas, the Cayuga UCW president and "Ice Breaker" with introductions, and a

period of music. Rev. Mr. Wood, exchange minister from Australia, here to observe the work of the United Church of Canada, was introduced and welcomed. He told of the progress being made toward church union in his country.

Mrs. Harry Lambert, president of the Erie Presbyterial United Church Women, called on the chairmen of the three Divisions to give their program presentations. The Stewardship Division through an amusing skit, "St. Peter Look at Me!" showed the significance of Christian relationships with others and that often real

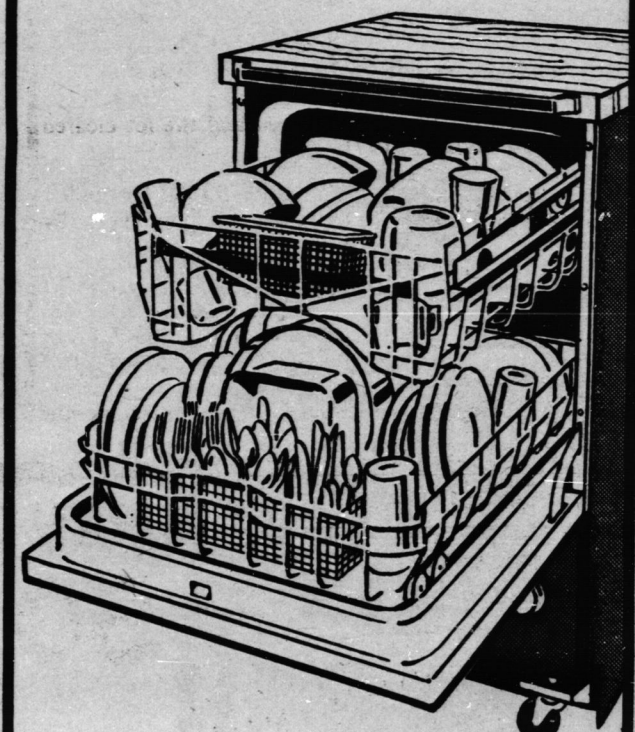
Mrs. Robert Marshall was hostess for a Tupperware party in her home on Thursday evening.

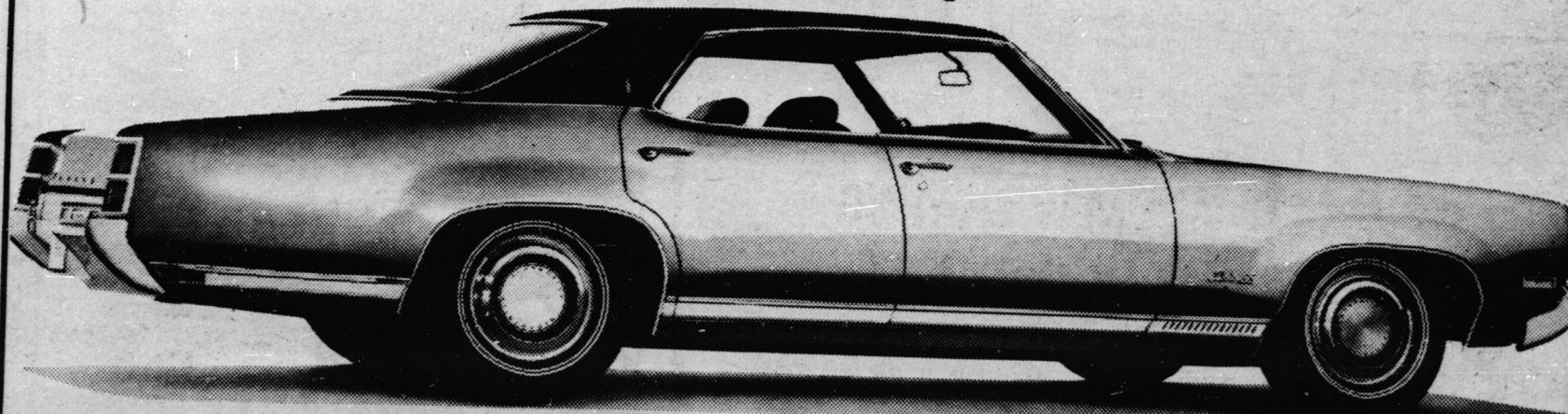
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
