

Commercial League Report

The Smoothtown — Fisherville contest opened up last Tuesday's hockey action in the Hagersville Arena, and it was a dandy game to start the evening. The hard skating youngsters from Fisherville broke into the lead with Keith Buxton rapping home a pass from Ray Foster. Not to be denied, however, Gil Bomberry of the Bruins evened the game shortly after, Allen White assisting. As the second period drew to a close, two quick goals by Fisherville sent them into a 3-1 lead. First Glen Morden, then Art Schweyer, scored on nice passing plays from Blair Otterman and Keith Buxton.

As the third period began, the action got faster and the game developed into a real battle. Smoothtown came back strong, trailing 3-1, and the Bomberry boys, Mike and Gil, fired home back to back goals to knot the score. A see-saw contest ensued with Fisherville taking the lead 4-3 when Rae Foster broke in alone to beat Doug White, Smoothtown's net-minder. With Fisherville short-handed only minutes later, the Bruins came back to even the match again as Mike Bomberry snapped in his ninth goal in three games. Not appearing disheartened however, Fisherville once more forged in front 5-4 as Paul Folsom took a pretty pass from Glen Morden to beat White again. As the final minute ticked away, the Smoothtown team put such tremendous pressure on Fisherville goalie Reg Schweyer, that it seemed almost impossible for him to stop all the rubber thrown at him. With just 28 seconds remaining Ross Johnson and Mike Bomberry set up White to tie the hockey game 5-5. Both clubs played "good hockey," with Fisherville picking up it's first point, and Smoothtown remaining unbeaten.

In the second game the Springvale Flyers took on the big team from Garnet led by F. McKeen, Phibbs, Miller, White, Awde and Co. The Flyer's Larry Winger banged in a rebound with the Garnet team short-handed for the early lead. Moments before the

period ended Ted Phibbs of Garnet took a lead pass from Dave Pankhurst and beat H. Tisdale in net for Springvale to tie up the contest 1-1. Garnet jumped into the lead 2-1 when Barry Miller fired home a Fred McKeen pass with Joe Powless of Springvale off for interference. Gord Winger of Garnet rapped in a Bob Awde rebound to make it 3-1 only minutes later and the Flyers seemed to be on the run. However, one Flyer seemed to have goalie Albert Powless figured out and Larry Winger's second goal of the game closed the gap to 3-2. As the period ended Bob Awde found a corner and beat the Flyer's net-minder after taking passes from Gord Winger and Boyce White.

In the final period, the Garnet team, led by Fred McKeen, Ted Phibbs, and Barry Miller, seemed to be in complete control. McKeen made the score 5-2, Miller assisting, then Phibbs banged in a shot while flat on his back, assists going to McKeen and Miller for a 6-2 Garnet lead. Springvale didn't give up however, and the plucky Flyers got a pretty back-handed goal from Jim Bradley, assisted by Larry Winger, who I thought played stand-out hockey all evening. At 8:07, the Flyers closed the gap to 6-4 as Joe Powless and Jim Bradley combined on a nice rush with J. Powless beating A. Powless. The final goal was scored by Fred McKeen, his second of the game, as Dave Pankhurst sent Fred in alone with a lovely lead pass. Late in the game, Murray Winger of the Flyers was robbed by a great glove save from Garnet goalie Art Powless. This was an excellent, well-played hockey game with fine refereeing; compliments are in order for Peter Myke and Paul Kett.

Now, for the evening's final contest. The Hawks and the Merchants squared off to do battle with much of both teams punch, lacking because of absent

players. Murray Johnson, who started at center for the Hawks, took the opening face-off, zoomed in alone and tucked in a beautiful goal for the score — only to have it disallowed on some technicality arranged by coach Lou Atkinson. Nice play anyway Murray!

When the game did get rolling, the Hawks scored first as Denny Wilson fired in a pass from Lorrimer and Thomas. Both teams were having difficulty moving the puck and their frustrations were evident as penalties marred the game. As the third period opened with Hawks still ahead 1-0, Jarvis' Don Anderson scored to tie the contest, Jim Hazlett assisting. The action began to pick up when Bruce Whitford put the Hawks ahead at 6:56. In short order, Jim Herkimer made it 3-1, Lorrimer assisting and Bill Allender notched yet another for the Hawks for a 4-1 lead late in the game. Jarvis' final goal came as Larry Vokes banged in a Jim Hazlett rebound. With two wins and a tie, the Hawks are alone on top of the commercial league this week. Fans are missing some excellent hockey by not coming out Tuesday nights to the Hagersville Arena.
