New Fire Hall For Hagersville?

HAGERSVILLE — The village may be faced with constructing an entirely new fire hall.

This was disclosed Tuesday when Fire Chief Bill McClarty presented the fire department's proposed

changes to its fire hall to council.

The department's sketch plan included a 30 foot addition to the present building plus an eight foot addition on the front. This would lengthen the ground floor to 14 feet.

Chief McClarty said: "The plans were drawn with future needs in mind."

The hall would have three 12 foot doors for fire trucks and a 10 foot door for an emergency vehicle.

The consensus of council was that the plan was very good but looking at it realistically it meant, basically constructing a new building.

Reeve Lyle Furry commented: "We would be starting from scratch."

Council decided that because only one wall of the old building would be left it would be as costly to construct additions to the old building as it would be to build a new one.

On Reeve Furry's suggestion it was decided to have the Fire Chief get in touch with W. O'Sullivan, fire services advisor of the Fire Marshall's office, to get his advice and assessment of the situation.

In other business council learned it will lose its interest on the November to spring period of the Ontario Department of Highways grant because some of the road work has not been completed.

Also it will lose the subsidy on road expenses on a job being done by Cayuga Quarries because it is not complete.

Ontario Farmers Get 25 Percent Property Tax Rebate

TORONTO (Special) — Ontario farmers will get 25 percent knocked off their property taxes before the end of the year it was disclosed Tuesday.

One qualification of the new subsidy is that farmers who have less than 11 acres must have a gross of more than \$2,000 to qualify.

Treasurer Charles MacNaughton made the announcement in the absence of Premier John Robarts, who was in London attending funeral services for Rt. Rev. G. N. Luxton, Bishop of Huron.

The move came after the Ontario Federation of

Agriculture and the Ontario Farmers Union started campaigning for a tax revolt by withholding the education tax portion of property taxes.

Opposition members termed the program "election bait" after it was learned it will cost the Ontario government \$20 million.

Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough said the proposed legislation wasn't meant to wipe out education taxes but conceded it would have this effect in general terms.

He explained the plan this way. Assume a farm is assessed on a 50-50 basis for land and building. Since municipal and education taxes are roughly split 50-50 it means education represents about 25 percent of the tax.

Country Market Expands

SIMCOE — Roxburgh's Country Farm Market has doubled its floor space.

John Roxburgh is holding his second grand opening for the store in six months. The official opening for the new store was in May. An enlargement for more floor space was almost started immediately.

Mr. Roxburgh told the Record it will now be easier

and more convenient for his customers to shop in the store with its wider aisle and longer display counters.

Before starting in the produce market business Mr. Roxburgh spent nine years as a radio announcer and newspaper writer. His father was liberal M.P. for Norfolk. Mr. Roxburgh's wife is a shareholder in the business.

Hagersville Midgets Get OBA Title

LAMBETH — Hagersville Midgets captured the OBA Midget C championship when they nipped Lambeth here in the deciding game by 6-5.

Hagersville won the opener by an 8-7 score and dropped the second game in a 4-3 decision.

Hagersville got its winning run on a double by Petracco driving in Forbes who had reached first on an error.

A triple by Stewart and two errors put Hagersville out in front in the first inning.

But Lambeth fought back with a grand-slam homer by Burgess in the third. Hagersville got those back in fourth scoring three runs on a double by Vanni and three Lambeth errors.

Stewart and Vanni were the big guns for Hagersville but Davey and McKeen each had a hit. Burgess had two other hits for Lambeth but fell short of a victory for his club.

Man Victim In Farm Accident

An area farmer was instantly killed in a freak accident two miles west of here Saturday.

Clayton Harold "Harry" Burke, 69, of R.R. 5, Simcoe died when he got entangled in the mechanism of a farm forage wagon while engaged in filling a silo.

Police said the accident occurred about 5:30 p.m.

Daniel O'Dwyer and William Gibbons, who were helping Mr. Burke fill a silo with ensilage, were at the top packing and Mr. Burke was down below on the wagon.

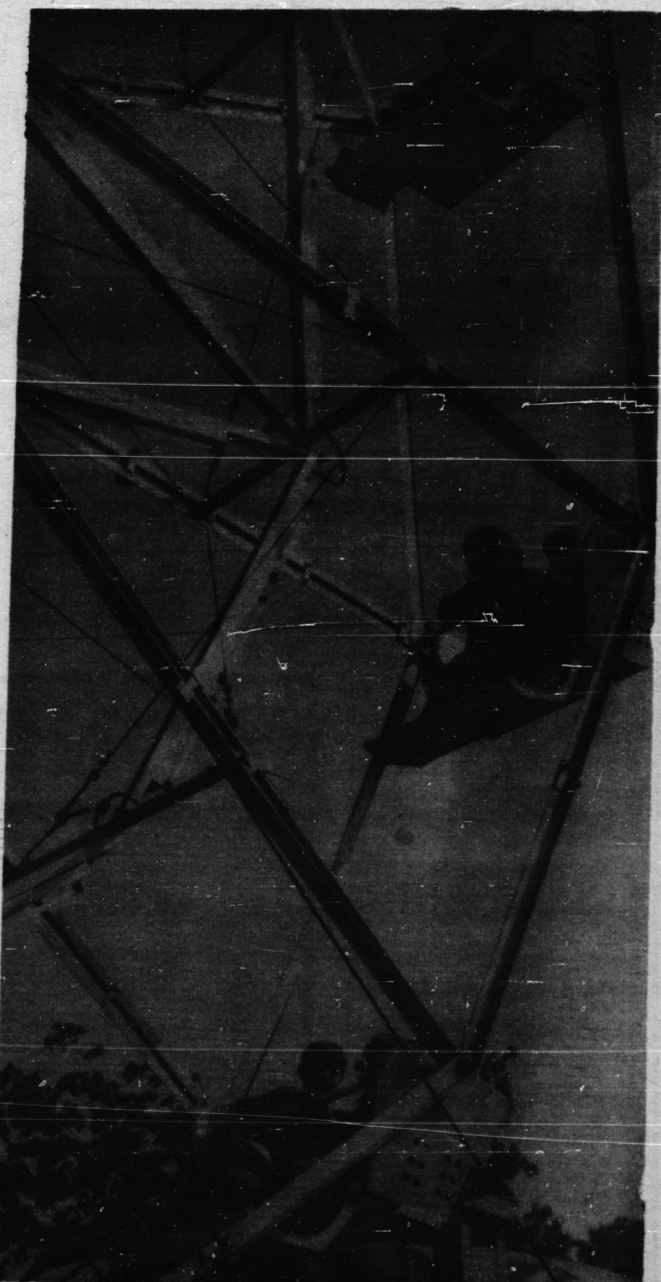
