Cheap Books For Poor Students

drive to sell cheap books of modern classics and English-speaking developing countries has been launched by Penguin

Books, Britain's biggest firm of paperback book publishers. The cost of textbooks and good fiction has always been a headache

for schools and universities in countries where students are often too poor to be able to afford the books which their professors recommend. The BBC World Service reports that the Penguin International Edition will consist of titles which have already sold well in Britain and Europe, and therefore can be produced again very cheaply. They should be invaluable to educational institutions in the target countries, specifically in India, Pakistan, Burma, Ceylon, Malaya and Singapore. An eventual sale of well over 100,000 for some of the titles is expected.

New Subdivision And Hotel For Jarvis

A new residential subdivision and a commercial area will be located on the 235 acre site on the northeast

side of Jarvis recently purchased by Explorer Inns Ltd.

The plans show 32 residential lots, a 25 acre site for the motor hotel and a large commercial area proposed for a shopping centre.

Weekly Weather

Walpole Has Dangerous Situation

Walpole has a very dangerous situation on Nanticoke Road between Highways 3 and 6 where there are two railway crossings without protective signals.

The main line of C.N.R. through to Fort Erie is being used by the Norfolk and Western Railway, which has fast and frequent trains using the line that crosses at that point.

One fatality has already occurred at the crossing when a hydro truck collided with a train.

A spokesman for a train crew in St. Thomas told The Record his crew has had many close calls at the crossing. His words were: "we're going to kill somebody at that crossing."

It may be argued that vision is clear for nearly a mile at the crossing. However, it is usually the drivers that are thinking about something else that will be the ones to get it.

A signal device would possibly bring an approaching train to their attention.

The most northerly line goes through to Hamilton. The southerly line is the main line to Fort Erie. The time to get protective signals at the crossings is now - not after another fatality occurs.

To Hold Liquor Vote In Jarvis

Village residents will vote on the question of having liquor outlets in Jarvis.

This was the decision Tuesday of council after receiving a request for a license for both diningroom lounges and cocktail lounges.

The request from the Explorer Inns Ltd., was endorsed by a proprietor of a local hotel.

Council decided a separate vote would be held on the question, instead of having it along with the regular municipal election to be held in December because of a 90 day time limit under the regulations.

Reeve Dr. W. A. Austin told council there was a promise to pay for all expenses of the plebiscite in the letter requesting the vote.

He also explained if council didn't endorse the request for the vote the people who want it could force the issue by getting a petition signed by 25 percent of Jarvis residents.

In the meanwhile council learned that Michael Lyпка, of Hamilton, is ready to start construction of a

32-unit motel, which will also include a restaurant and coffee shop and possibly a liquor lounge.

Mr. Lyпка told council his company, Explorer Inns Ltd., will start construction as soon as it gets the necessary approval from the Ontario Municipal Board in Toronto.

He said that he would be setting up a meeting with the chairman of OMB and members of council to try and speed up the process.

Tenders for the building have been called by the company, he said.

In other business council was questioned on what had been done about a petition signed by 60 ratepayers protesting a broiler chicken operation in the village.

Delegate, Robert Poole, of Jarvis asked if council had any correspondence over the matter with air management.

Reeve Austin said: "I appreciate your problem as I know what it smells like especially in hot and humid weather."

He said the Health Department has assured

council that the chicken broiler proprietor has taken adequate steps to control rodents. Also the exhaust fans in the chicken buildings have adequate controls and are up to standards.

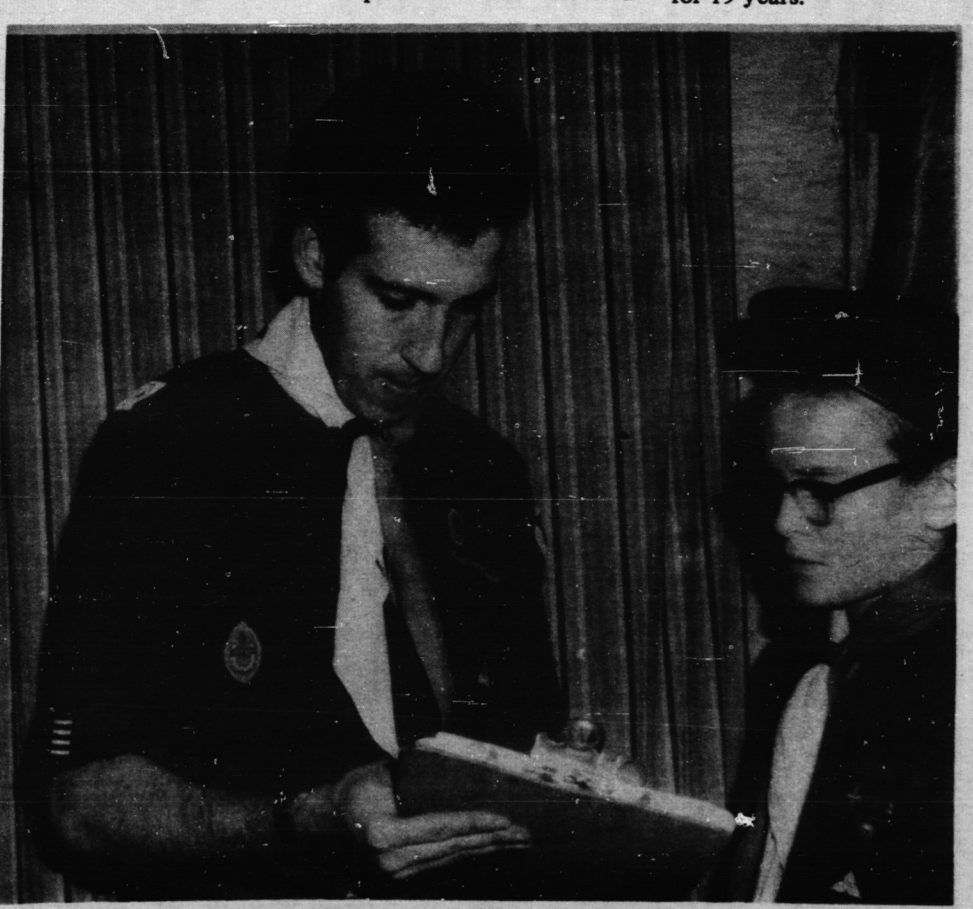
He said council would contact air management about the matter.

- Learned there would be a nomination meeting for candidates to stand for election for a seat on the Haldimand-Norfolk Roman Catholic School Board in Dunnville Nov. 23.

- Learned in a letter from the Ontario Water Resources Commission stating it was in sympathy with a village request for a larger water intake to be constructed by Ontario Hydro so it would serve also for a municipal water pipeline as well as a supply for the hydro plant.
