

H.S.S. Parliamentary Government

Hagersville Secondary School is the first school in the area to have a parliamentary government — the new format of our students' Council.

H.S.S.'s parliament is under a two party system, to provide for a consistent student government which will be carefully checked by the opposition party. In May, all the Students' Council executive is elected except for the Prime Minister. The Prime Minister is elected in September and then he appoints the second Public Relations Officer.

In May, the speaker is appointed by the council executive. His job is to become familiar with the major rules of parliamentary procedure. A Governor General is also appointed by the council executive. His function is to sign all passed bills.

In September each class in school selected two candidates (one Red and one Gold). The party leader with the most class representatives elected in September will become the Prime Minister.

At the opening of Parliament the Governor General would read the

speech from the throne. In this speech the year's activities are outlined to the ruling government and loyal opposition.

Reverend Percival E. Deeth

Funeral services were held in Parkminster United Church, Waterloo Monday, October 5, for Rev. Percival E. Deeth, retired United Church minister. Services were conducted by the minister Rev. Walter Murray assisted by Rev. J. B. Moore, chairman of Guelph-Waterloo Presbytery and Rev. Ed. Shaw of Elmira. The address was given by a long-time friend of Mr. Deeth, Rev. Milton J. Aiken who is retired and living in Burlington.

Mr. Deeth was ordained in 1927 after having served the Y.M.C.A. in Ottawa, Guelph, Regina and Winnipeg. He was General Secretary of the Guelph Y.M.C.A. from 1912 to 1917 arriving at the time the now 'old' Y building was being erected. In 1966 Mr. Deeth returned to Guelph to participate in transferring documents from the old cornerstone to the new at the dedication of the new Y.M.C.A.-Y.W.C.A. building.

During his ministry Mr. Deeth was a member of Hamilton Conference and served at Jarvis, Lynden and Arthur. Retiring in 1952 he served two more years as supply in Holstein and then

Mr. and Mrs. Deeth lived in Hillsburg until Mrs. Deeth's death in 1966. Mr. Deeth was pastor of Wesley United Church, Jarvis from 1929 to 1933.

Mr. Deeth has been a well-loved resident of Parkwood Manor in Waterloo for the past three and one-half years until his ill health necessitated nursing home care. He is survived by a son, Wilfrid, Vancouver, a daughter, Isobel, (Mrs. L. W. Perry), Toronto, and predeceased by his wife, Florence and a daughter Dorothy, (Mrs. L. E. Jackson). Also surviving are six grandchildren, Paul Deeth, Toronto, Alan Deeth, Vancouver, Donald and Brian Jackson, Ottawa and Kathryn and Ian Perry, Toronto.

The Prince Arthur Lodge of the Masonic Order, of which Mr. Deeth was made an honorary member in 1969, held a service on Sunday evening at the Edward Good Funeral Home in Waterloo.

Mr. Deeth, who was in his ninety-second year, was born in Richview, Ontario, in 1879 and is the last of six sons born to William John and Eliza Deeth descendants of Etobicoke pioneers.
