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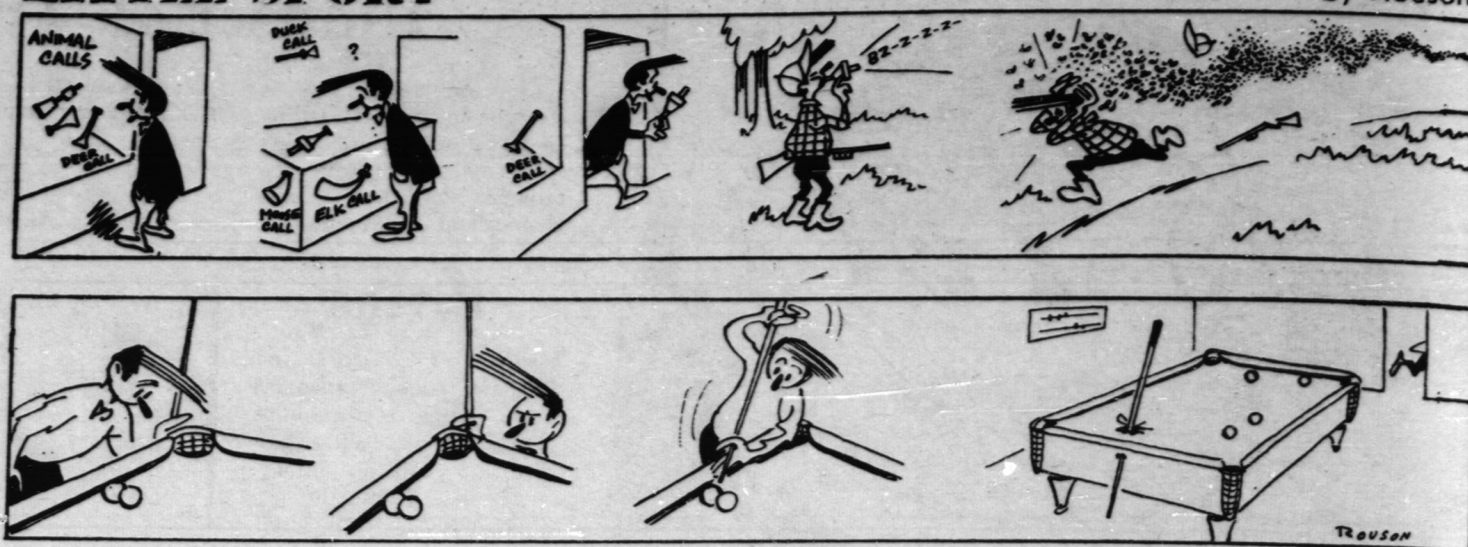

It happens every year about this time. The new models have been introduced and a lot of people are shopping around for another car — or at least looking at the newest offerings from Detroit and elsewhere. I'm certainly not going to recommend a particular make and model to you that will save you the most money, but I do want to mention a few points about financing that car you may be thinking about.

As I've mentioned before in response to readers' questions, consider the finance charge of an automobile purchase as carefully as you consider

any other part of the deal. It's just as important, in considering your total payment, as any optional equipment you add. Don't save money on the car itself only to lose it through extra finance charges.

First of all, know exactly how much you're going to pay for financing that new car (or used car). Very few of us can afford to pay cash these days.

Secondly, remember that you don't have to take the dealer's financing arrangements, or his insurance for the matter. But you can't waste any time because you should shop for credit before you decide on your car.

Here's what to do. Shop around the dealers' showrooms and see what you like. Find out what the total purchase price will be and then take that price and start shopping for credit.

Find out how much it will cost you to finance that much money from the different lenders available to you. Then, get your credit approved in advance. Select the lender who offers you credit for the amount you need to borrow at the lowest cost.

When all the arrangements are made with the dealer and the lender, you simply pick up a check from the lender, present it to the dealer, and drive away in your new car.

Remember, if you're looking at the new models, look at the new (and old) lenders at the same time. Both are important if you are really going to drive away in a bargain.
