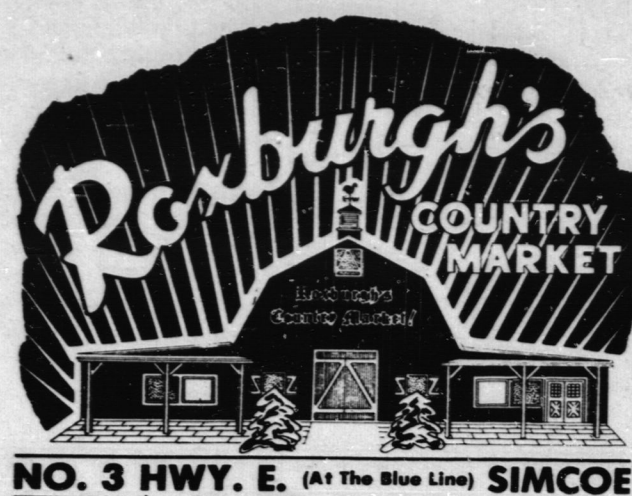

## New Firm Locates At Kohler

KOHLER — A hanger of the former air force base here has been purchased by a Binbrook firm.

A tender from the company of \$18,766 has been accepted. The purchase includes a hanger, which is in a state of deterioration and 6.3 acres of land.

Reeve Roy Hedley of North Cayuga said the firm will manufacture wire-bound wood boxes and other items.

Operations will begin immediately and the firm will start maintenance work on the building, he said.

The firm is owned by John Cadman of Binbrook. Meanwhile the Kohler Rural Youth Centre will continue to be used as an agriculture hall. The base was constructed in 1939 as a practice landing field for aircraft flying out of No. 6 service flying training school at Dunnville.

Temperatures will range in the 60s in the daytime and 45 to 50 at night.

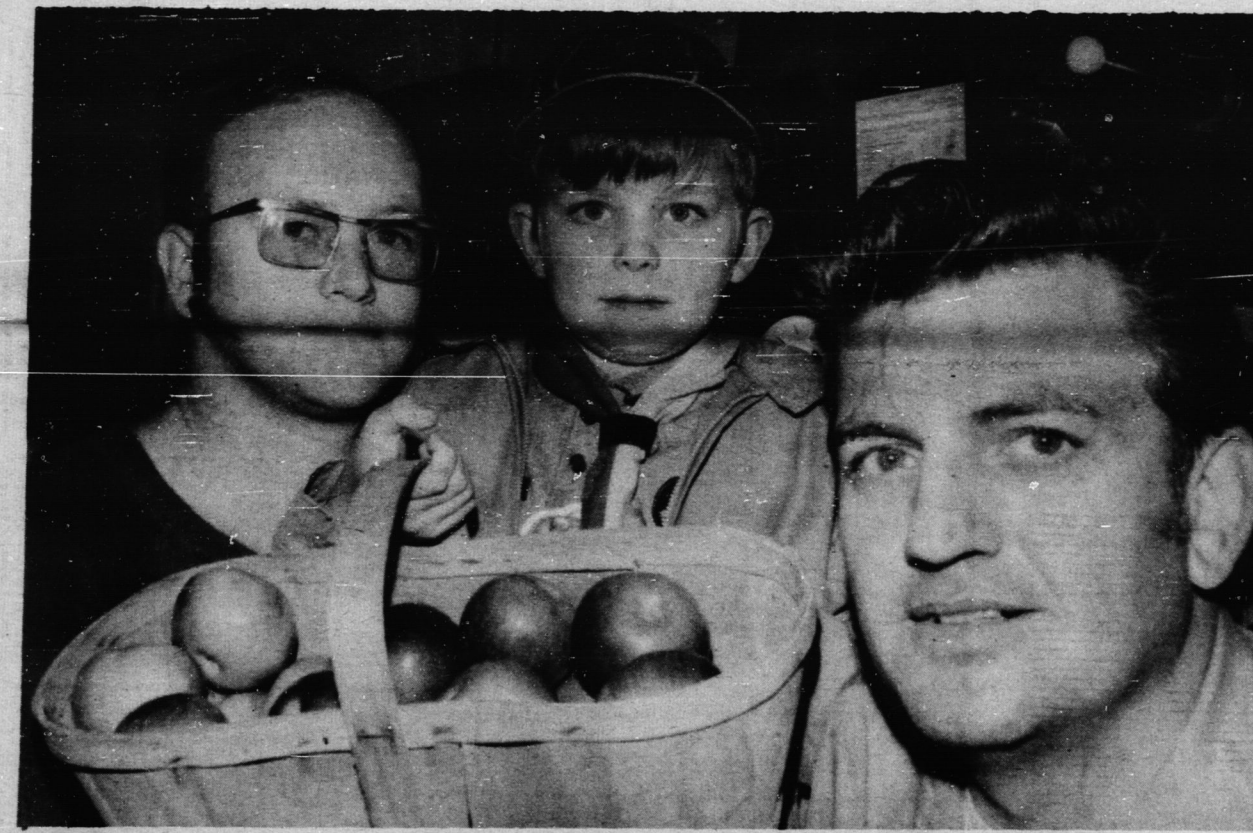
No rain is forecast for the period, said the weatherman.

## Sod Turning Ceremony At Grandview

DUNNVILLE — Grandview Lodge, home for the handicapped, will hold a sod turning ceremony Monday afternoon. The first sod was turned by the lodge members and a \$1.6 million addition to the building is to be completed immediately.

Friday Haldimand Council completed arrangements for the sod turning by passing a bylaw authorizing a \$840,000 debenture issue to help finance the project.

Gilchor Construction Co., of Dundas, has been selected as the contractor for the project. The company submitted the lowest bid.

## Haldimand To Ask Protection Signals At Hazardous Crossings

CAYUGA — Haldimand County Council will ask provincial authorities to install signal devices on a crossing on the Humber Road between roads 3 and 6.

The crossing was the scene of a fatality April 1, when a Willowdale man was killed.

Train crews at St. Thomas told The Record

the crossing has been the site of several near misses although visibility is good from both directions.

County officials said the crossing is hazardous because the newly built road is of such high quality and the land so flat that drivers don't realize there is a crossing.

Council Also:

\* Will ask the Federal Department of Transport to okay railway signal devices at Attercliffe Station crossing on Robinson Road in Canboro Township.

\* Criticized the Ontario Health Department for withholding a grant of \$90,000 to the Haldimand-Norfolk Health Unit.

\* Discussed a joint garbage plan for five of

Haldimand's municipalities.

Here are the details:

Haldimand has asked Ontario to declare the joint Haldimand-Norfolk health unit a district eligible for a 75 percent grant.

The province had offered to increase the unit's grant to 50 percent subsidy only if it joined Brant and Oxford to form a four-county district.

Dunnville deputy-reeve Dr. Kenneth Mustard said the two-county district shouldn't be deprived of the extra grant just because it lacks other partners.

"I think the people here deserve it because the two-county unit is operating very efficiently," he said.
