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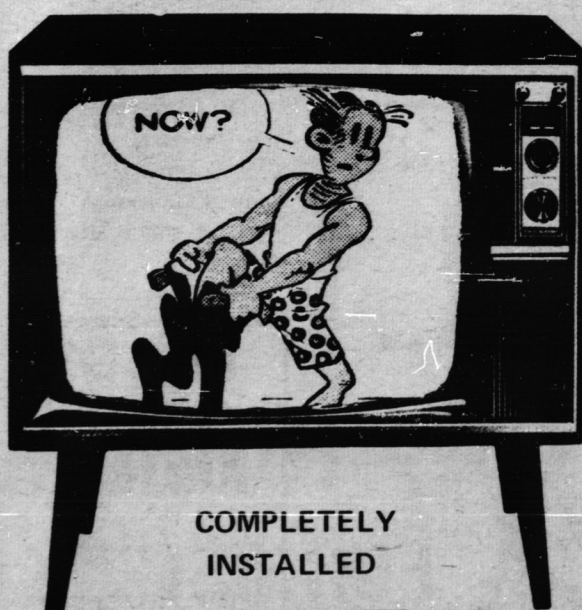
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St. John's Evening Guild

Mr. Larry Short was the victim of an accident in the village on Saturday. Larry was treated at the hospital for second degree burns and released.

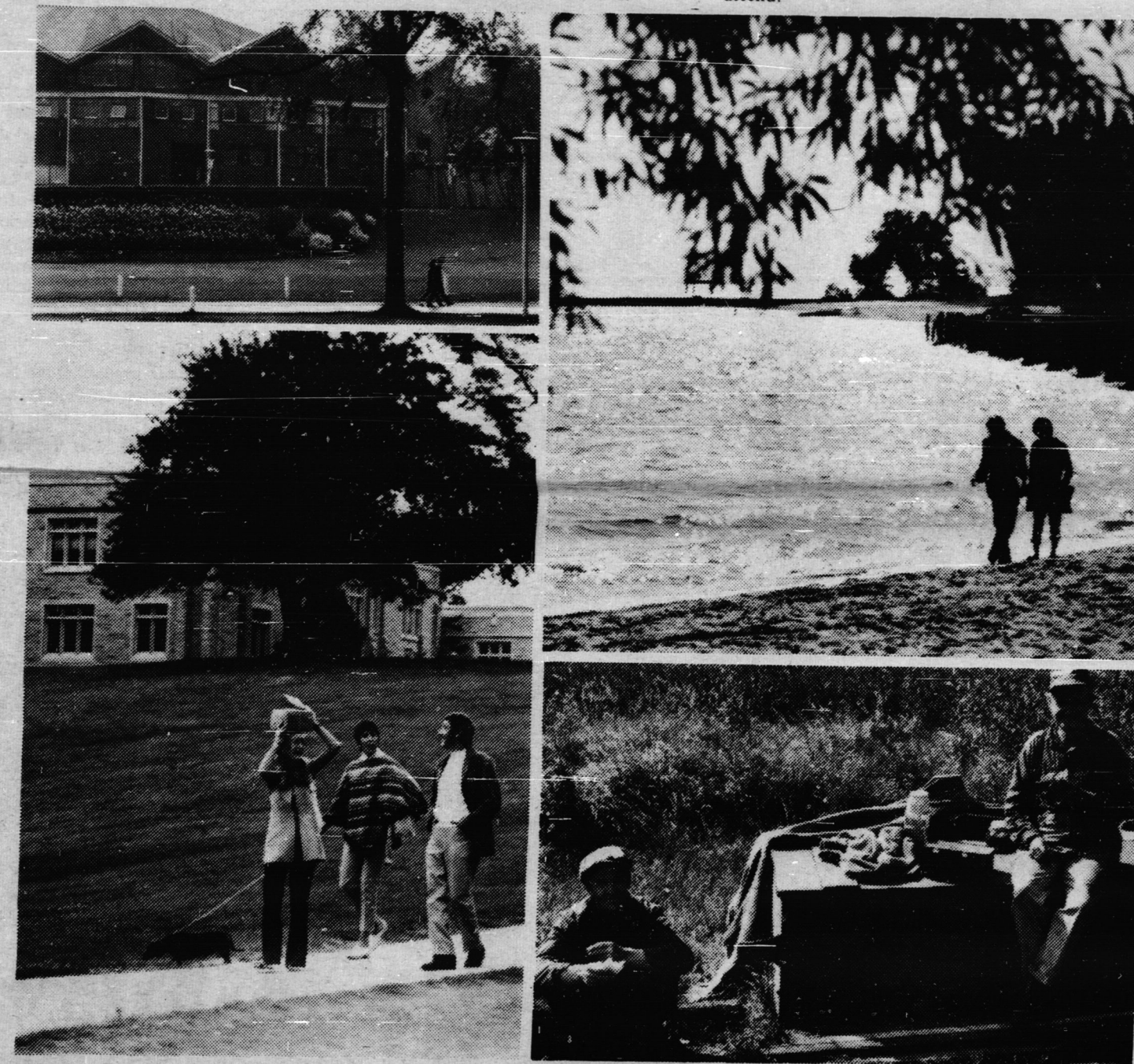
