CAYUGA — After a full day of talks Tuesday between the hourly-rated employees and the Haldimand Board of Education, a new offer will be made to the employees Tuesday.

The employees are members of the Service Employees' Association. They have been without a contract since June 30.

Douglas Otterman, association secretary, stated all matters had been settled except the annual one.

Because of this the employees decided to ask the Department of Education to help settle the matter.

Other matters in contract had been settled in other meetings of the board.

Mr. Otterman said the wages are not very far off. "This difference is a little but it's just that I couldn't see eye to eye," he added.

Both sides have agreed to consider a two-year contract.

The old contract ran from July 16, 1969 to the end of June this year.

Mr. Otterman added specifically that there is threat of a strike by the employees.

Land And Forest Building Officially Opened

SIMCOE — Lands and Forests Minister Rene Brunelle officially opened the departments new headquarters here at the intersection of Highways 24 and 3.

The building on the corner was originally purchased by the Ontario Department of Highways during reconstruction of the highways.

The building was then renovated by the Forests and Land Department for a division headquarters.

It walls are covered with rustic pine siding giving it a similar appearance to offices in other parts of the province.

Mr. Brunelle commented when he officially opened

the office, perhaps one of the highlights of this building is its first rate communications network.

He said there would be a connection on the network to the Simcoe OPP detachment.

The Lands and Forests Department now has a wild life detachment head and two conservation officers posted at Simcoe. Two more conservation officers will be added as well as a management forester and a private land forestry technician who will be working in the area.

The division serves some 84,000 people of Norfolk and Haldimand Counties as well as 756,000 people who visited provincial parks in the counties this year.

Erie Pipeline Likely

HAGERSVILLE — A water pipe line from Lake Erie to supply inland municipalities will probably be constructed.

This was the consensus of council Monday, after a letter from the Ontario Water Resources Commission was received and confirmation that Ontario Hydro has approved construction of a larger water intake at the Nanticoke Generator site.

Reeve Lyle Furry commented, "I think there will be a pipeline because the larger intake was approved."

The Hagersville Fire Department won't get new quarters for its fire equipment this season, it was learned.

Reeve Lyle Furry said the fire department will have to find a place to keep its truck the same as last winter.

One councillor commented he had heard a fireman say, the department doesn't need the third truck.

Coun. Ross Slote said, "We could have the Jarvis Department here in case of emergency in six minutes."

Reeve Furry said, "I don't think that we should commit ourselves for too much until we get the survey in."

A survey is being conducted in West Haldimand to determine the fire fighting equipment needs for the area.

In other business Coun. Slote, chairman of the streets committee revealed he is \$1,700 over his budget.

"I've been under the budget for the last two years so I should be allowed to go over once," he said.

Reeve Furry agreed "We will be able to get by with less money next year so I don't mind going over the budget in this case."

Council also:

- * Went into closed session to discuss planning and a meeting with firemen.
- * Passed a money bylaw to authorize the Clerk to borrow \$60,000 until villages property taxes are collected.
- * Authorized a debenture issue for \$17,492 to pay for sludge digestion facilities at the sewage disposal plant.
- * Appointed Jack Kincaid to look after purchasing a gift for Miss Anna Almsa, who resigned as librarian after 40 years service.
