## Hagersville Expecting Increase In growth

HAGERSVILLE - Expected increase in growth here because of industrial developments on the north shore of Lake Erie, has magnified problems for the village.

Reeve Lyle Furry told The Record Hagersville is prepared for future growth with the exception of sewage and water facilities.

For this reason we have endorsed the study of the Ontario Water Resources Commission and its recommendation of water pipeline for a water supply for inland municipalities.

Some six local municipalities have also

endorsed this recommendation, he said.

He also noted the Haldimand-Norfolk Study Committee recommendations suggested a main sewage disposal line be also incorporated with the water line.

"Our problem here is that we have no river or creek that will take the water from a sewage disposal plant. The plant itself is capable of a much larger capacity but because we have no receiving stream we cannot enlarge it."

"There is an indication O.W.R.C. is going ahead with a pipeline for water as

Ontario Hydro has agreed on construction of a larger intake in the lake so it can take care of inland municipalities," he said.

Mr. Furry said: "Speaking just as a citizen of the area, I would rather it keep its rural atmosphere, however, since we are going to have to grow with the times, we want to be prepared."

He said if the Haldimand-Norfolk Study prediction that there will be an influx of 300,000 people in this area will get some growth.

Mr. Furry has served six years on Hagersville council. He is the first reeve under a new two year term of office for the village started in 1969.

## Plan Ahead

TORONTO - Hunters and other persons planning to use private logging roads for recreation purposes this fall and winter would be wise to contact the company involved ahead of time for information on rules governing such use, advises Murray D. Seeley, of Thunder Bay, president of the Ontario Forest Industries Association.

"By planning ahead, the hunter will know exactly what is expected of him while he is using a private forest road and the extent of the company's responsibilities and his own," he points out.

Many logging companies opened their roads to sportsmen with the understanding that they will respect the company's rules concerning fire and other hazards of woods travel. In most cases, such arrangements have worked out well in the past.

He stressed that great care must be taken in the use of high-powered firearms by hunters while hunting in such areas.

"Logging company work areas are clearly marked, and hunters should give such areas a wide berth to avoid accidentally injuring woodworkers," he said.

The same care should be accorded to farmers, river drivers and others working in hunting areas, as well as to other hunters.

He also called upon sportsmen to exercise care in their use of fire while in the woods. Last year people using Ontario forests for recreation were responsible for 262 of the total of 900 fires. Although the forest industries have about 10,000 men working in the woods during the fire season, only three fires were attributed to them.

While organized sportsmen's groups are aware of the benefits of contacting logging companies in advance about the use of their roads and timber limits, new hunters and others do not realize the importance of such action.

He said there has been a steady improvement in relations between the industry and sportsmen who make use of the forests for hunting, fishing and other recreational pursuits.
