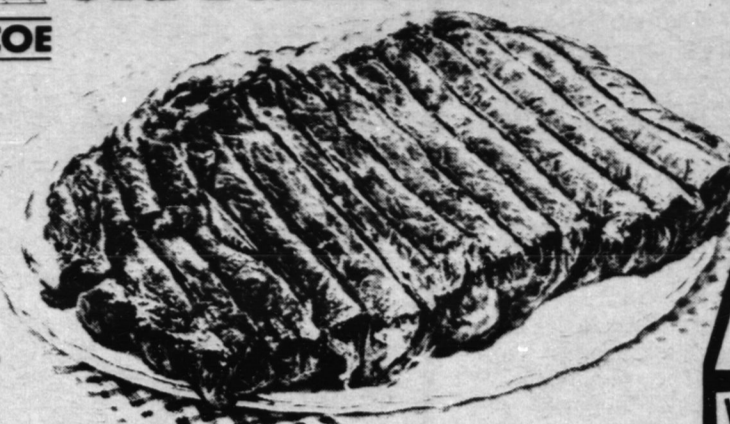

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Citizens Protest Chicken Barn

Jarvis residents are up in arms about a chicken barn being operated in the Village.

A petition signed by 60 protesting the operation in the middle of the Village was presented to council Monday.

Objections to the operation were listed in seven points.

These were:
- Odor.

- Pollution of The Creek a tributary of Sandusk Creek.

- Noise - "squawking" of chickens when they are being loaded or unloaded.

- The multiplication of rats.

- A fire hazard.

- A second chicken barn has been started. This should be curtailed.

- Reduction of the value of nearby property.

Robert J. Cole of Jarvis headed the delegation of three to council.

He told council that it should take steps to clean up this situation.

Council asked if he had called the Haldimand-Norfolk Health Department or the provincial Fire Marshall.

He replied he had called health officer Dr. A. A. Washburn who told him that it was a council matter.

Reeve Dr. W. E. Austin said, "Rats have always been there. In fact they run the cats out of the dump."

Council decided it would investigate the matter by getting in touch with the Fire Marshall and the Health Department.

Mr. Fransen said that it looks like secondary schools will have a larger enrollment than last year.

School population in elementary schools in Haldimand may be down this year while secondary students may increase.

However, a final report has been established for kindergarten which has an enrollment of 573 this year compared with 607 a year ago.

A bylaw was passed to prevent residents or commercial businesses from using air conditioning units that require town water for their operation.

Decided to prepare a bylaw to extend the term of a councillors term of office from one to two years.
