

## On The Farm Front

It's time for the annual reminder to avoid cutting alfalfa three weeks before and after Sept. 25. Cutting during that period reduces the chance of over-winter survival. Where it is required an application of fertilizer now also helps alfalfa to survive. On local clay soils the most likely fertilizer required would be 0-46-0 at 100 to 150 lbs. per acre. **NELLES CORNERS ONTARIO** - Merv Treichler, the gentleman farmer from Sanborn, N.Y., scored his first 20 lap Modified-Sportsman Feature victory of the season here at Cayuga Speedway last Friday evening. Doing a fine job in the Gill Bruss No. 2 coupe was Niel Truesdell, who copped the runner-up spot. Five time feature winner Chuck Boos was closing in on the leaders at the checker, but had to settle for third, ahead of Gordy Treichler and Cam Gagliardi.

Merv dogged early leader Ron Williams for four fierce laps, then blasted by for the lead, moving away from the pack, looking to get back the 20 lap feature record, held now by his cousin Roger, at 105.13 m.p.h. Merv looked like he might have it, but cousin Rog, Jim Rudolph and Williams all tangled in turn No. 2, bringing out the caution flag to slow the race on lap 16. Merv took the checker four laps later, but not the record.

In the companion 15 lap Late-Model go, Dave Van Valkenburg of Lockport, N.Y., led from flag to flag to record his first career Feature win. Wayne Ready moved from ninth to the second paying spot, followed by Jim Laughing, Ralph Book and Larry Fuller.

The terrific T.Q. midjets saw Stan Kuwabara of Hamilton Ontario, cop his fifth 20 lap Main event of the season, in a fine display of driving. First year rookie Bob Martell, who led from the green, lost the lead to Kuwabara on the next to the last lap, but held on to second. Lloyd Dempster, George McIntyre, and Bruce Bolitsky followed across the line.

Kenny Daniels walked off with the Mini-Stox 20 lap Feature, with Held, Bunting, Schlitt and McCarthy following.

Bill Brainard and Merv Treichler were Mod-Stox heat winners before Bill Torrisi captured the consolation.

Ralph Book tied Ken Cassel's eight lap Heat record (97.82 m.p.h.) winning the first, as Phil Edwards took the second Late-Model qualifier, with Ross May the consolation victor.

Anthony, Bubing and Robinson were Mini heat winners, as Kawabara Armstrong and Crawford copped the T.Q. preliminaries.

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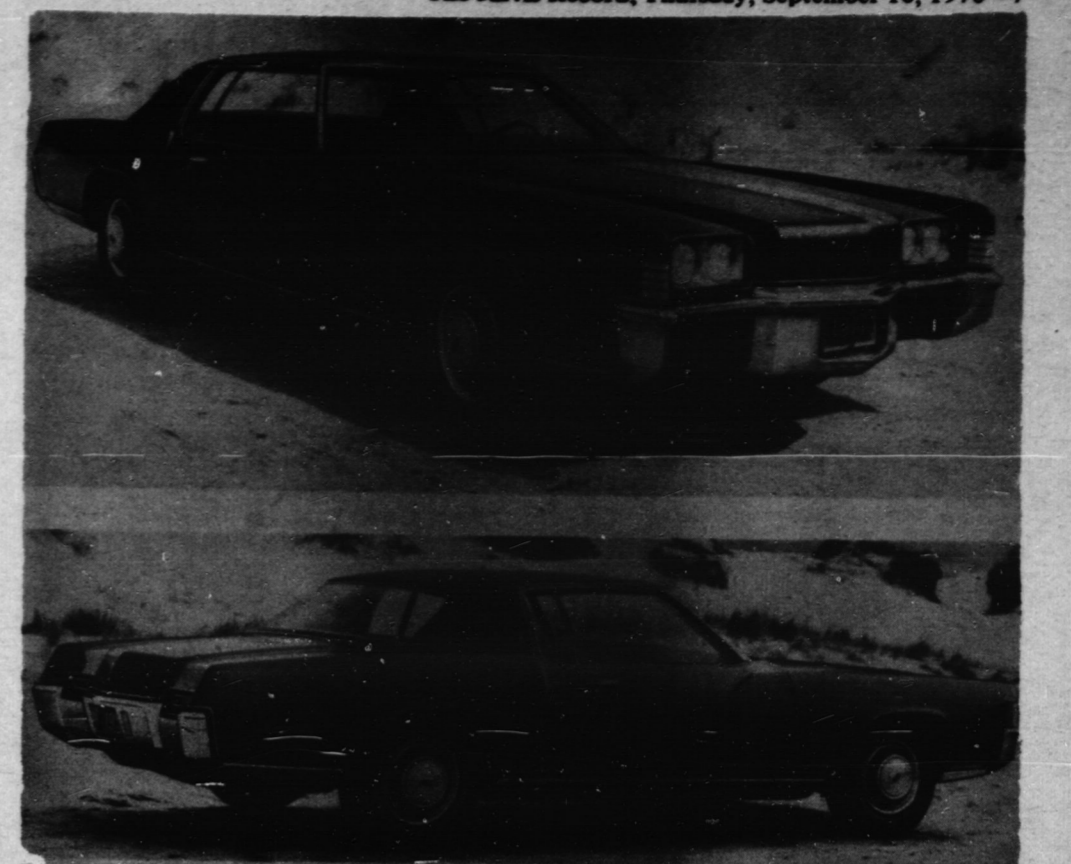
