However, when challenged to produce comparative non-farm figures for the same counties, he was unable to do so.
It is reported Gordon Hill, President of the O.F.A. stated that the Ontario Federation of Agriculture figures referred to working farmers, not the average of all census farms, many of which are not supporting a family in his comment to the meeting.
