Assessment Jump 440 Percent

CAYUGA — Haldimand's assessment has jumped 440 percent council learned at its session Friday.

It was explained the high jump in assessment is not because of any new development but because of new methods of calculation based on provincial equalized assessment.

This year's total, on which 15 municipalities in the county will pay, is \$260,024,909 compared with \$60,992,646 a year ago.

Mill Stone Placed As Permanent Monument

mill stone that was found September 15, at the school fair held in celebration of centennial has been transferred to monument home at the front of the municipal office for Jarvis and the township of Walpole.

The stone was dedicated Monday E. A. Brooks at the school fair.

J. Snowden and his son Tobie moved the stone from the bottom of Nanticoke Creek where it had been used for many years as an anchor for a water wheel.

The monument is a lasting reminder of the tools that contributed to the health and economy of the area over 100 years ago.

Gordon Miller was chairman of the centennial committee in 1967 and worked in co-operation with Bill Snowden, who was chairman of the school fair.

The fair, sponsored by the Township of Walpole, featured a mammoth parade of school children both on foot and floats.

The five schools of Walpole staged an old fashioned school fair with exhibits of sewing, baking, collections, crafts, writing, art, grains, vegetables, flowers and pets.

Plaques were given to each of the five schools in commemoration of the centennial event by the women's institutes of the Township.
