Hagersville Seeks Water Pipeline

HAGERSVILLE Council will seek action on a water supply from a Lake Erie pipeline it was learned

at its regular meeting Monday. Ontario Water Resources Commission after a meeting in Brantford last week with representatives of several municipalities found that the city of Brantford wasn't interested in a water supply from the lake.

O.W.R.C. had spent \$200,000 for a year long study for a proposed \$85 million pipe line that was to serve Brantford and several other communities along the way from the lake.

Reeve Lyle Furry told The Record his council decided action should be taken to show O.W.R.C. that other municipalities were interested in the proposal even though Brantford wasn't.

A special meeting was called last Friday by Hagersville to air its views. Attending the meeting were representatives of the municipalities of Walpole, Woodhouse, Jarvis, Port Dover, Cayuga, Waterford and Hagersville. The

meeting was also attended by Charles Lattimer and C. E. McIntyre, both of the regional planning branch of the O.W.R.C.

Reeve Furry said it was the consensus of those attending the meeting that each municipality at its earliest convenience would pass a resolution stating their position on the matter. The resolutions would be forwarded to Donald Collins, chairman of O.W.R.C., Premier Robarts and Energy and Resources Minister Kerr.

At the meeting Monday council passed a resolution stating that because Hagersville requires an ample supply of good quality water for future growth it therefore supports the principle of a pipe line from Lake Erie in co-operation with Ontario Hydro in constructing a larger water intake to supply the municipal line as well as the generating station.

Reeve Furry said: "It is my idea O.W.R.C. is still trying to get Brantford interested in the project. However, if this fails O.W.R.C. might consider a smaller size project that would serve the communities here.

Board Changes School Name

CAYUGA Haldimand Board of Education changed the name of its secondary school here.

The new name is Cayuga Secondary School instead of Cayuga Technical and Commercial High School.

A new addition to the school has introduced education programs not generally taught in a vocational school. In other business the Board at its meeting last week debated removing the word retarded from its schools.

No decision was reached on how to replace the word. One trustee suggested Special Education Centre. However, the board decided all students in the county are special.

Fire Chief Blasts Council

HAGERSVILLE Council got a blast for a lack of facilities at its fire on Monday.

Chief Bill McClarty told council the department had no facilities and a "poor showing" for firemen visitors from the community.

You have the best fire department in the county the one that gets the most out of it. You won't

have one if something isn't done soon," he declared.

He said the department wants a new bay and bathroom facilities added to the fire hall.

He asked Reeve Lyle Furry what council had done so far about adding a new bay?

Reeve Furry replied the fire committee had been instructed to get a price for construction six weeks ago. Both members of the

committee were absent from Monday's meeting.

Chief McClarty asked how the fire committee could get a price when no member of his department had been approached as to what it wants.

He said it was impossible for the department to keep its extra truck at the West Haldimand General Hospital ambulance bay another winter.

"In fact after two years I would be ashamed to go and ask them."

Reeve Furry agreed it was time to "stop begging for a place to keep the truck."

Chief McClarty said when the fire truck is stored in a place other than the fire hall it has to be brought to the hall when other equipment is out to a fire and then returned afterwards.

Council asked Chief McClarty to submit a plan to council of what the department wants. Council also promised to act on the proposal immediately.
