Highway Crew Fighting To Save Bridge

CAUGA - The bridge spans the Grand River Highway 3 has deteriorated more this span sank some 14 in the last few days as a load limit to be the bridge. A truck traffic is being held at Jarvis to take alternate route on Hwy 6, crossing the Caledonia. Highway signal man is at the Jarvis section of the bridge to warn drivers to take the detour. Ontario Department of Highways crew is working around the clock to try to repair damage to abutment rollers, which siezed because of cold weather. When the rollers siezed they broke away parts of the cement piers making the damage more difficult to repair. Car traffic crossing the bridge is being sent across at certain distances to keep the pounding of the bridge to a minimum, a spokesman said. Traffic is being restricted to 10 to 15 m.p.h. and department of highway officials say if drivers do not adhere to them the bridge may have to be closed. The ban on heavy trucks may also be expanded to include school buses. Cayuga OPP are patrolling the area to enforce restrictions. In the meantime the load limit on the bridge has forced the layoff of 25 men at Cayuga Materials and Construction Co. Ltd. The men were sent home after a company official refused to use detours for dump trucks because it wouldn't be economical.

Walpole Association To Air Complaints

here Sunday at the Selkirk Community Hall to form the Walpole Township Citizen's Action Association. The association wants to help air complaints of land owners in the township through the council, the Ontario Municipal Board or the Regional Planning Committee. Mrs. John (Dorothy) Lauek, vice-president of the association, told The Record that one of the issues being looked into by the association is warrants issued to land owners charging them with illegally living in cottages all year around. She said the Township bylaw was passed in 1968 but the majority of the people served with warrants have owned their properties for many years. At the special meeting Sunday, Reeve Gordon Miller attended along with two other council members to answer questions from the floor about the warrants and other matters. Mr. Miller said he would try his best to see that all matters of townships land owners will be cleared up to the satisfaction of all concerned. The hearing on the "residents all year round" matter is scheduled for court in Cayuga some time in April. The associations records show that a Cayuga OPP constable, who served the warrants on a Sunday about 8 p.m., said there were about 14 more to serve after leaving one with one property owner. An exact number wasn't revealed. She said that the question of what is the main objection of the township to these people living in these buildings all year around hasn't been answered by any of the municipal authorities. She said that it is the objective of the association to have a delegate attend all council meetings. "In this way we can keep the public informed, at public meetings of our own, of what is going on in many different situations, especially with the projected development in the area," said Mrs. Lauek. At the meeting Howard Nicklin of Lamb's corners was elected president, Mrs. Lauek, vice-president and Mrs. D. Gilbert, secretary-treasurer. The board of directors elected were Bernard Mayes, Herb McKay, Herb Cove, Ed Gazley, Reg Moyer, Pat McMenemy, Ken Smith, Eric Doley, Brian Kaufman, Howard Finlanson, J. Patrick, and R. Nordin.

First Step To Power At Nanticoke



Construction forces for Ontario Hydro and contractor, Babcock Wilcox Canada Ltd of Galt have achieved the first landmark in preparations for commercial operations at the Nanticoke Generating Station on Lake Erie. The goal: to prove that the boiler system is capable of withstanding the tremendous operating pressures of 2450 pounds per square inch and temperatures of 1000 degrees F and thus secure approval from Department of Labour (Ontario) for Hydro's operation of the boiler. The main boiler system is filled with 235,000 gallons of water from Nanticoke's water treatment plant which removes all natural impurities before the water is pumped into the boiler. The water-filled system is then pressurized to 4,315 pounds per square inch to test the "water tightness" of the boiler. See Page 5, Col. 6
