Twenty-three exhibitors made 97 entries in the recent Haldimand Corn and Forage Show. The best exhibit in the show was also the champion silage exhibit won by Ernie Isaac, Canfield.

Rodney Fox, Cayuga, won the award for Junior exhibitor with the largest number of points. Wayne Burgess, Hagersville, was the Junior exhibitor with the largest number of entries. Senior point winner was awarded to Oosterhoff Bros., Dunnville.

Champion hay exhibit was shown by Rodney Fox. Winner of the Livestock Ration Class was Grant Richardson, Dunnville.

A special Corn Management project is offered this year for up to 15 interested corn growers. Don Campbell, Dunnville, is the chairman for this committee of the Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association. Extension persons including the agricultural engineer, soils and crops, and farm management specialists, will start advisory farm calls in April. Detail will be available from directors of the association. An outline of the project will also be made at the annual Spring Corn Night to be held at Cowan Farm Supply, Dunnville, on Mon., April 19.

About 160 Haldimand young people are now enrolled in the 1971 4-H program. The organization meeting has been held but there are still a few days for latecomers to get in contact with one of the club leaders or the county agricultural office.

Foresters have prepared a list of guidelines to help reduce the danger from grass fires:-  
Check with your local township office to learn of the bylaws controlling the setting of fires.  
Notify your local fire department when you plan to undertake a burning operation.  
Burn only when the wind is calm.  
Have as much manpower on the scene as possible.  
Hand tools such as shovels, brooms, water pails, and spray cans should be on the job ready to go.  
Build fire breaks around the area to be burned and back fire if possible.  
Keep tractor and plough handy. This is one of the best tools to control grass fires on arable land.  
Burn the area in small sections, one at a time.  
Know where you can obtain assistance should the fire get out of hand.

Mike Salvatore and the Hagersville Bantams will face into the All Ontario Finals against Uxbridge by one of their thrilling 6-5 over Dresden here on Saturday afternoon. This was the third game of the series in Hagersville winning 7-4 at Dresden Saturday.

On Wednesday night big Townsend scored two

goals for Hagersville and Bill Nagel one to end three periods of play tied at 3-3.
