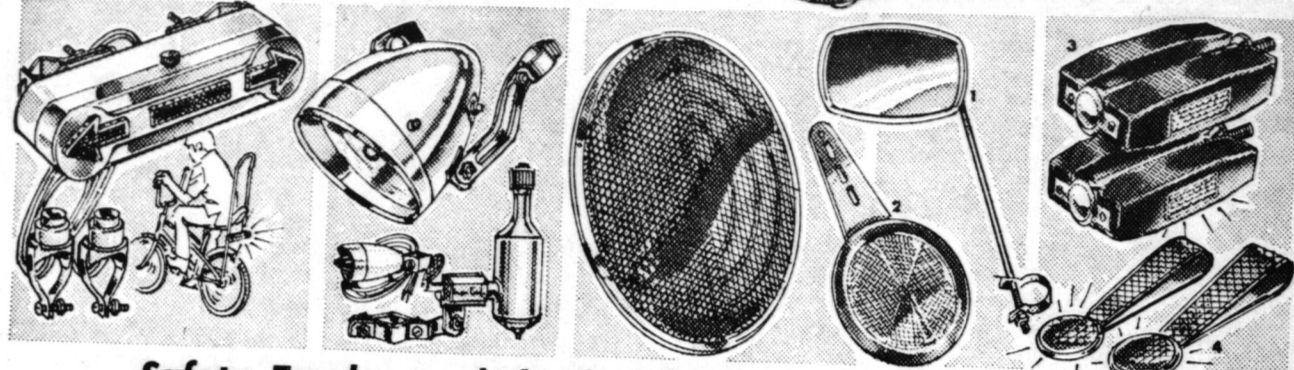

Cayuga Ratepayers Get 3.78 Mill Increase

CAYUGA — Residents here have a tax increase of five percent over last year.

After hours of budget shaving council came up with an increase of 3.78 mills over last year's rate meaning the average residential assessment of \$9,000 will have an increased tax bill of \$3.78 a thousand dollars of assessment or \$35.02.

Clerk Albert Key said the rise in the rate reflects a lower equalization factor as well as an extra levy from the county.

The village will also have to pay an additional

\$15,000 this year to complete a connecting link through the village on Highway 3.

Public school commercial mill rate will be 31.099, residential 28.376. Separate school commercial rate will be 30.916 and the residential rate 28.212.

The village will be required to raise a total expenditure budget of \$104,588 less revenue in grants, licencing fees and rents.

Reeve Ted Powell said that the council doesn't have any control of a good part of the budget and the county levy was responsible for three-quarters of a mill in the overall increase.

In other business council heard Clerk Albert Key explain how a complaint was made about snow not being removed from in front of the new post office.

He said that a resident had complained about snow not being removed and had stated if the village had a snow removal bylaw he would see that this would be put on the next maintenance contract.

Reeve Powell told council he wanted it made clear to A. T. Stitt, Cayuga, Postmaster, that the council itself hadn't registered the complaint.

Mr. Stitt explained that the snow had become hardened to nearly caked ice before the animals was made to the new post office and this was the reason it hadn't been totally removed.

He said that he thought he had been personally criticized about not having the snow removed and thus his explanation to council. Clerk Key said the village has a snow removal bylaw and two copies had been sent to the resident who had complained.

2 Injured In Weekend Crashes

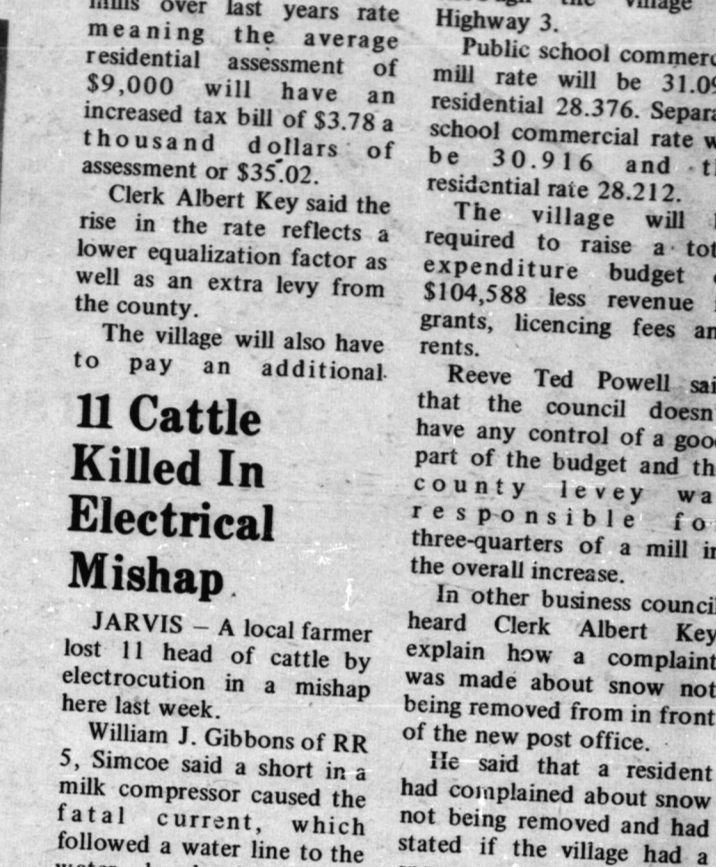
JARVIS — A Cayuga man was injured in a crash just east of here Saturday.
