# Record Sales Of \$11,688,408. For Norfolk Co-Op

Norfolk Co-Operative Co. Ltd., had a record year in 1970 in sales it was reported at the annual meeting in Simcoe on Tuesday night, April 6. Sales reached \$11,688,408 a \$876,324 increase over 1969 after paying customer volume discounts and before income taxes, net savings were \$103,201. This will enable the Co-Op to return \$67,188 in patronage returns to members. Mr. Keith Goble the Co-Op president welcomed about 200 people to the annual meeting. He spoke of some of the highlights of the past year and informed the meeting of the expansion programs for 1971.

He stated that starting immediately four 30,000 bushel silos will be added to the grain elevator in Waterford. This will give us a total storage capacity at the Waterford elevator of 370,000 bushels he stated. He also told the meeting that construction was already underway for a second receiving facility at the grain elevator in Courtland. This addition will triple the speed of unloading trucks at harvest time. G. W. McNern gave the general managers report and said that most of the increase in volume was due to the large handle of corn last fall. He thanked all those present for their loyal support during the past year.

Guest speaker for the evening was Mr. Don Moffatt - Manager Retail Services Division, United Co-Operatives of Ontario. There were two new directors elected by those present to serve a three year term. Mr. Bruce Miller, RR 2, Simcoe, Ontario, and Mr. Roy Smith, RR 2, Simcoe, Ontario, were elected. Other directors presently serving on the Board are L. Culver, Keith Goble, N. Hill, Russell Jamieson and W. P. Watt.

# Charitable Organizations To Give Accounting

**HAGERSVILLE** - Council here will demand accounting within 30 days proceeds from raffles. Coun. Robert Gedyde told this is one of the conditions under which the licenses are granted since the new system into effect not one organization has done this has been granted a licence.

"This is a must under the rules," he said. Council decided it would see that the reports are made from now on.

Council also refused to grant a raffle licence to the Red Pioneer's Car Club because none of the people who signed the application were 21.

In other business council decided it would withhold a decision about supplying water and sanitary sewer facilities to a proposed new industry for Walpole until it was disclosed the amount of water needed as well as the number of employees expected to be employed.

Council also:  
- Decided to make no commitment for dumping facilities until it gets new application forms. The present contract expires July 15.  
- Learned the Ontario Department of Highways had made a survey of town streets to verify work that had been completed for subsidy grant.  
- Learned a free rabies clinic will be held for household pets at the Fire Hall on April 23 from 1.30 p.m. until 5 p.m.

## Defends

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Due to lack of permanent housing in the Township, industry has created a problem by forcing a large number of workers to make use of the cottage area for all year round residences in contravention of Township by-laws, the Ontario Planning Act, the Local Health Unit Regulations and Ontario Water Resources Commission Pollution Regulations.

Due to pollution hazards the protection of long standing residents cottage owners is of interest to the council who feel they would be remiss in their duty in not giving the cottage areas, the protection they are entitled to under the by-laws, until some other means of protection by the Ontario Water Resources Commission or Health Unit is possible to allow all year round residence if it should be the popular wish of the entire waterfront. For this reason and this reason only is council resorting to court

time in the past expressed a wish to reside in the cottage area all year round.

When industry intimated they were interested in certain areas within Walpole Township, the Department of Municipal Affairs, Planning Branch, advised such safeguards as provided under the Ontario Planning Act should be considered for the Township.

After due consideration the council at that time agreed to apply an official plan and a zoning by-law to protect as far as possible every property owner under the Ontario Planning Act. Cottage owners would be protected in retaining their identity as summer homes. Agriculture would be protected as to land use. Industry controlled to the greatest extent possible. Council decided that the minimum of inconvenience to all residents and non-residents to be their aim in applying these by-laws.

He predicted that a new express highway that would go south of Cayuga might be started earlier especially in view of the condition of the bridge at Cayuga.

He said the focal point for most of the service lines (power, water, sewage and other facilities) is at Jarvis.

In other business council decided to renegotiate its water contract with the Ontario Department of Public Works for supplying water to the boy's school at the old Hagersville Army Camp.

Reeve W. E. Austin said the contract states that the rate can be negotiated annually. He said the Village is receiving 33 cents a thousand gallons.

Council learned that only three dog licences had been sold this year. It was decided to make a drive to get the licences sold. Licences are \$3 for a male and \$5 for a female.

Learned that a free rabies clinic will be held at the Jarvis Fire Hall April 21 from 1.30 p.m. until 5 p.m.

Decided to ask a ban of the use of detergents by the Ontario government after receiving a letter saying that 80 percent of phosphates must be removed by municipal sewage systems by the year 1973.

Reeve W. Austin said a ban by Ontario would be a much easier and cheaper way to do away with phosphates.
