When potatoes are cooked properly they can be an important source of vitamin C and food energy, says a release from the Canada department of agriculture. One boiled or baked potato without butter or gravy, supplies about 100 calories.

Though Canadians seem to prefer potatoes baked or french fried there are many other ways to serve them. Some are suggested in department publication 1058 on Potatoes.

Golden curried potatoes to serve six people call for: 1/2 cup finely chopped onion, 1/4 cup butter, 2 teaspoons curry powder, 3 cups cooked potatoes cut in thin strips, 1/2 chicken bouillon, 1 teaspoon salt, dash pepper, 1 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice.

Saute onion in butter until transparent. Stir in curry powder and cook about 1 minute. Add potatoes and stir gently until butter is absorbed. Pour bouillon over potatoes and simmer until liquid is absorbed (about 5 minutes). Add seasonings and cook a minute longer.

Potatoes in sour cream call for: 4 1/2 cups diced raw potatoes, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup butter, 1/2 pint dairy sour cream, 1 tablespoon flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, paprika.

Cook potatoes 3 minutes in boiling water with 1 teaspoon salt. Drain, add butter, cover and cook over medium heat until potatoes are tender (about 10 minutes), stirring occasionally. Combine sour cream, flour and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add to potatoes and simmer 5 minutes. Sprinkle with paprika before serving. Makes 6 servings.

As a variation on mashed potatoes, try potato croquettes with cheese. You need: 3 cups mashed potatoes, 1/4 cup melted butter, 1 beaten egg, 1/4 cup grated cheddar cheese, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 beaten egg, 1/2 cup fine bread crumbs.

Combine first 5 ingredients and beat until smooth. Chill until firm enough to handle. Shape in balls or patties. Dip in beaten egg then bread crumbs. Bake at 425 degrees until browned (about 20 minutes) or fry in 1/4 cup oil, turning to brown all sides (about 10 minutes). Makes 6 servings.

New potatoes cooked so they are crisp call for: 12 small new potatoes, 6 slices bacon, 6 slices bacon, salt and pepper, paprika, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley.

Scrub potatoes and cut in 1/4-inch slices. Fry bacon until crisp. Remove from pan, drain and crumble. Add potatoes to bacon fat. Sprinkle with seasonings and cook covered until slightly tender (15 to 20 minutes). Uncover and cook until potatoes are tender and golden brown (about 20 minutes), turning frequently. Sprinkle with parsley and crumbled bacon. Makes 6 servings.

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WTCAA Surprised At Walpole's Action

SELKIRK - The Walpole Township Citizen's Action Association expressed

surprise about the Township's action in publicly defending its

summer home bylaw last week's Record.

A statement prepared by President Howard Nicklin of the Association says the defending statement seemed out of place in view of a pending court hearing on the bylaw.

In his statement he says Reeve Gordon Miller's statement about Walpole bylaw "came as a surprise to all members of the association."

A court hearing for several persons accused of violating Walpole's home bylaw is scheduled for Cayuga Court, April 28.

The association claims it has been told by Walpole that the scheduled court hearing will be to test the Township's bylaw.

Here is the complete statement by the association:

The WTCAA wish to make this statement re Walpole Defends Bylaw as signed by Reeve Gordon Miller which appeared in the Jarvis Record April 15, 1971.

This statement came as a surprise to all members of the Association because of it coming prior to the cases in question being tried in the Cayuga Court House April 28 and that Council felt it necessary to defend a bylaw rather than to leave it to the good judgement of the Court to whom they have taken this bylaw for testing.

We speak with first hand knowledge after having conversation with Mr. Miller who says council testing the bylaws to see how valid they are.

This bylaw and many others are governing this township.

A large number of other bylaws under 1421,1444 and other amendments to date, could have been used as a test.

It is significant that the one governing a place of residence was Walpole's choice.

The Association has statements in letters and council minutes referring to this and other complaints. These will be read to all members of the WTCAA on April 25 at 2 p.m. at a special meeting at Nanticoke Community Hall.

The meeting is for members only. All members are urged to attend and property owners wishing to join may do so by getting a membership card at the door.

ONTARIO - Stelco start construction at the steel output should be near nine-million tons by 1980.

This seemed to be the binder in the speech by J. Gordon, who was president of the Co. of Canada,

Gordon, who was born, succeeds H. Fifth, who was elected man of the board and as the company's executive officer.

Gordon said the development is subjected to a high scrutiny and the pace of a good domestic economy in this decade.

He said that he is confident the project will be completed for production of million tons of steel by the 1980s.
