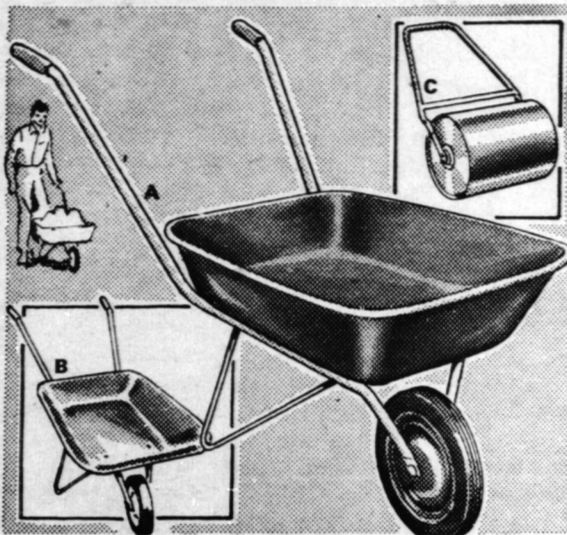

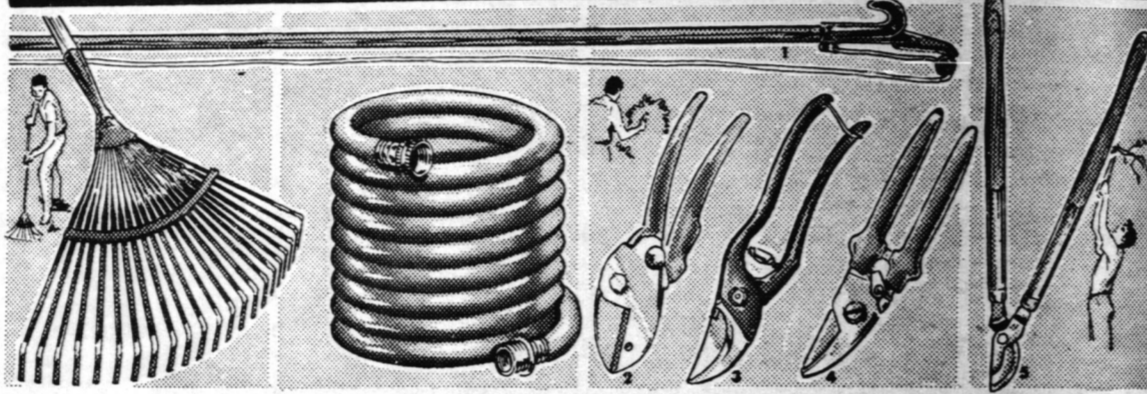

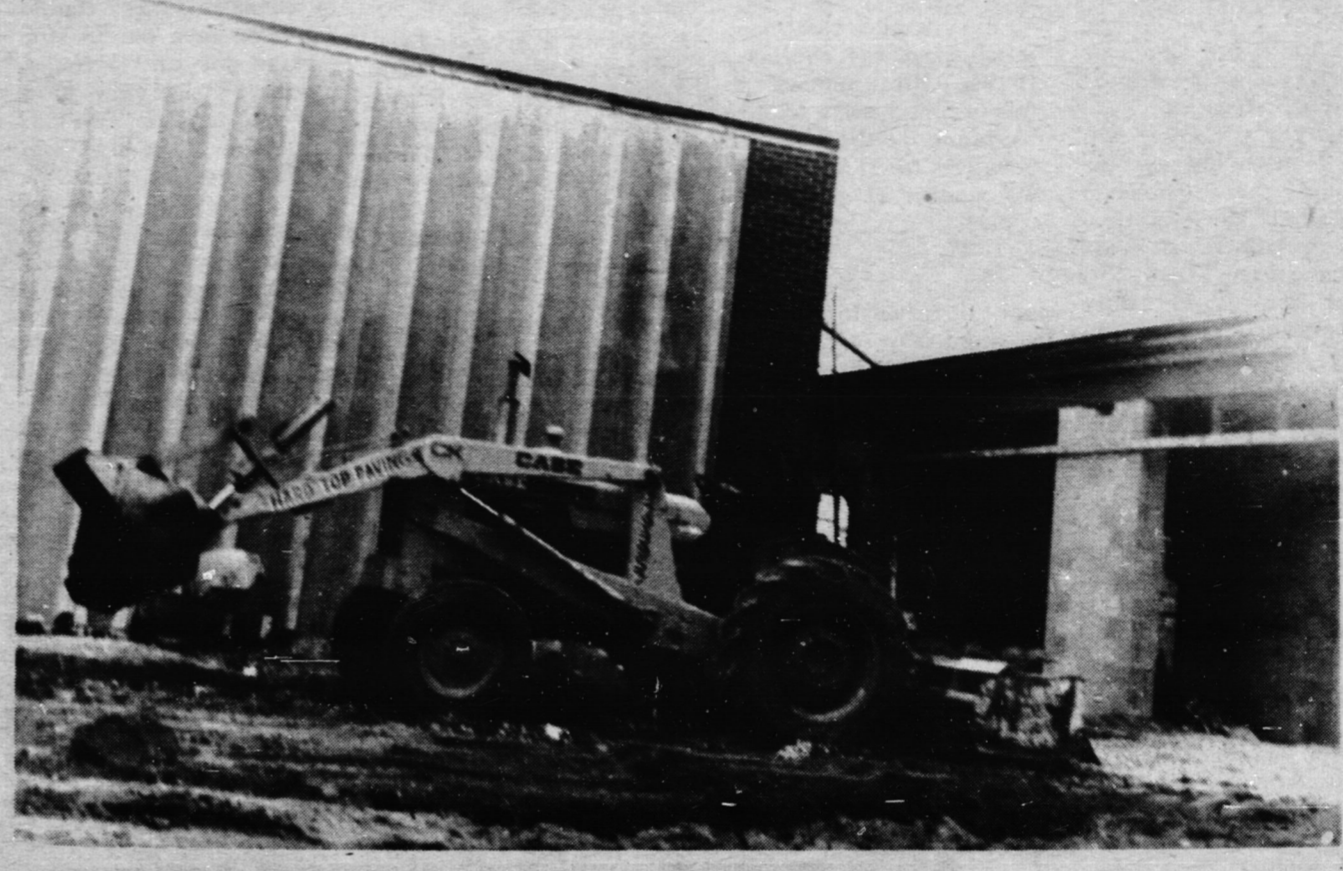

## Hagersville

### Rate

.68 Mills

HAGERSVILLE — Hagersville taxpayers here will pay more taxes over last year's rate after a budget session by council. At a special meeting on Monday, council decided it would go with an increase of .68 mills for public residential. The mill was set at 23.43 mills. This will mean an increase of 68 cents for every \$100 of assessment. Commercial public school rates will be up .53 mills last year. The rate was 25.51 mills. A separate school rate was set at 26 for commercial. Clerk Arthur Roth said new rates include an additional two mills for sewer debentures. He said the increases for Page 5 Col. 5 & 6

## WTCAA To Attend Walpole Council Meetings

WALTER KIRK — Some 125 ratepayers attended the meeting here Sunday to discuss the Township's laws governing the use of cottages. Walpole Township's Action Association met with council over the 15 land owners that are under a bylaw that bans the use of summer homes all year round. Council in an earlier meeting said its bylaws are the owners because they sense the hazards of cottages.

In a development at the meeting Hugh Greenfield, a former reeve of the township, declared himself in sympathy with the association and accepted a position as director. He said that he must defend some of the bylaws because he was on council when they were put into effect. "Building permits for additions or new buildings

will be refused if not approved by the Haldimand-Norfolk Health Board." See Page 5 Col. 6

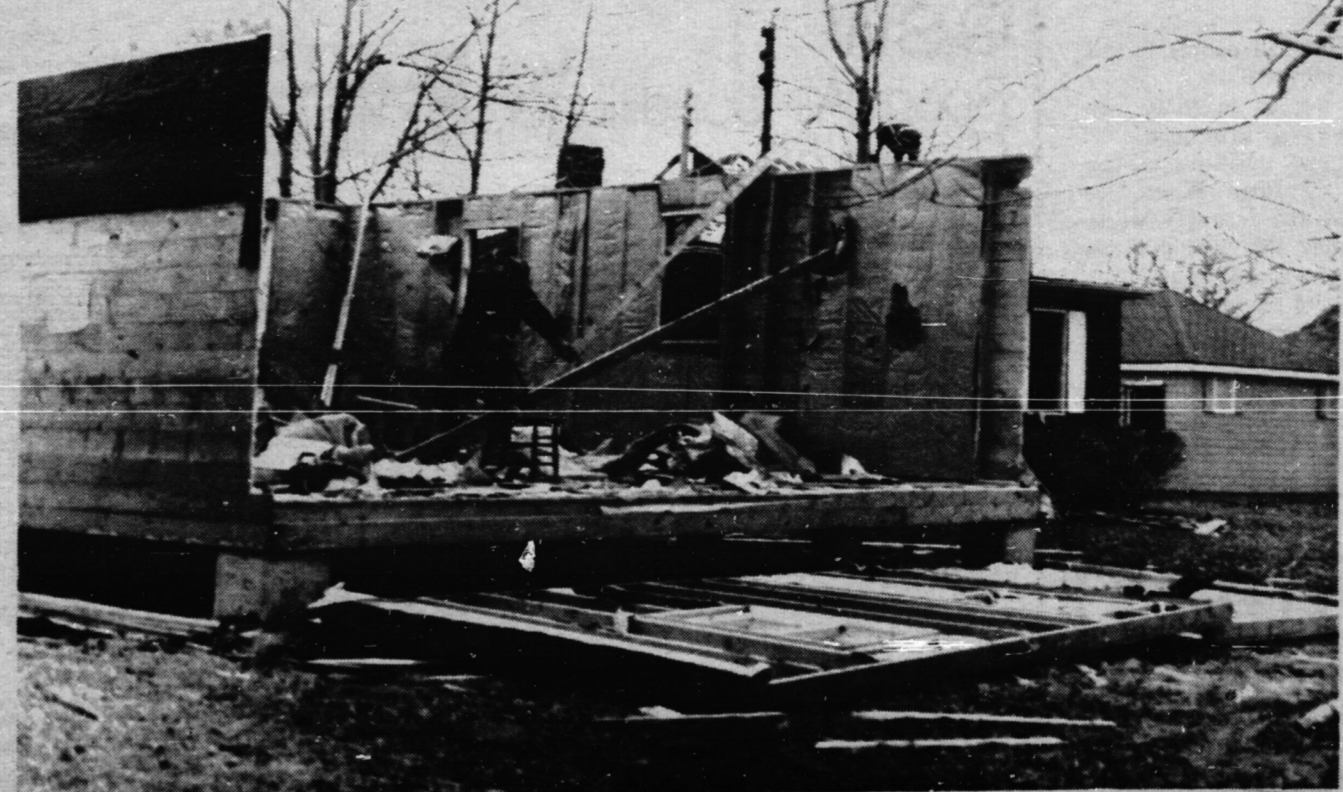
## Walpole Bylaw Case Remanded

CAYUGA — A charge of contravening Walpole's bylaw 1421 of using a summer cottage as an all year-around residence against Raymond Fleet of Lakeshore Drive, Peacock Point has been remanded until May 26. After hearing arguments from Ken Johnson,

prosecuting attorney, and C. Edward McCarthy, defence counsel of Hagersville, Judge Mark Gerrard suggested that the arguments be submitted in writing and presented to the court by May 26. He said he wanted defined exactly what a summer cottage is.

# Police May Arbitrate Wages

HAGERSVILLE — The police department here will be forced to go to arbitration if it doesn't accept council's offer to

increase wages across the board by five percent. Debating the issue at its regular meeting Monday council decided that it

wouldn't increase its offer for the five-man force including Chief Roy Holden.

Reeve Jack Kincaid told council that Attorney-General Allan Lawrence had made a speech in St. Catharines on the matter.

The speech stated a neutral but permanent body should be set up to arbitrate police and fire fighters wages.

Council didn't disclose what the police department had been seeking in a new contract with council.

However, Deputy-Reeve Ross Slato said, "If they get what they are asking for its time we have a hard look at the use of OPP to police the Village."

Coun. Norm Crawford said Chief Holden hadn't signed a new agreement for his salary.

"He stated that he would wait a while before signing it said Mr. Crawford.

Coun. Robert Gedy suggested council make his new pay retroactive to Jan. 1 and start paying it.

"If the Chief refuses to accept this I think he should resign," he said.

In other business council accepted in principle a proposal by Almas Company Ltd. to construct an 18 unit apartment building on the new section of the old Hagersville Secondary School.

The plan will be given to the municipality's planning board for consideration.

In other business council decided to ask the Ontario Department of Highways to make a survey of work to be done on town streets. The proposed budget for streets is \$55,000. After subsidies the Village share would be \$12,500. This is an increase of \$25,000 over last year.

The program includes work on the following streets: Almas St., Marathon St., Tuscora St., Athen St. and Carrick St.

Council also decided it would try to send delegates to the Town and Village section of the Ontario Municipal Association at Delhi on May 7 and 8.

## School Breakin

HAGERSVILLE — Police received a call early Sunday morning to the Northview Public School on Main St., N., where entry had been gained through a rear door. Approximately \$20 in cash had been stolen and two doors were damaged as well as books and papers were scattered about in every classroom.

Police apprehended two youths and four juveniles following the break-in and recovered \$19.65 of the money taken.
