

On The Farm Front

Planting or seeding dates can have a big effect on crop yield. Haldimand Crop Improvement data for last year shows a difference of over ten bushels of barley between April and early May seeding dates. Corn planted the week after the middle of May yielded 17 bushels less than the corn planted only a week before. Soybean data was the same

with eight bushels difference in yield from the last week of May to the first week of June.

The information is the average of that supplied by cooperators in 1970 high yield competitions. It is expected that similar results will be obtained this year.

Vitaflor D.B. was the chemical suggested during the recent Corn Night program for early control of Southern Corn Leaf Blight. This seed treatment applied just before planting would cost in the neighbourhood of 15 to 20 cents per acre. The systemic control of the leaf blight would protect the crop for the first three weeks or so, thus preventing early build-up of the disease from spores that have wintered here. This treatment would not replace the regular treatment of corn seed with D & L type chemical for insect control, but would be applied along with it.

Jack Ketcheson, Soils Department, Guelph, at the recent Corn Night said most Haldimand farmers know that working the clay soil too much leads to trouble. In his address, he also pointed out the importance of drainage. Good drainage is necessary in order to allow air into the soil for good plant growth. Avoiding compaction makes root penetration of the soil easier too.

Crop Improvement committee chairman Don Campbell reports that seven corn growers have entered the intensive Corn Management Program that has been started this year. Participants will be involved along with the agricultural engineer, soils and crops specialists, and others in problems solving and record-keeping from before planting through harvest and marketing.

9 p.m. April 22, 1971, a hold-up of Hoover Vacuum Products, No. 6 Cayuga, Seneca Township, investigated. A male suspect was armed with a handgun and demanded cash and two watches were taken. Prov. Teatime Topics

Planning is the key to balancing the family food budget, says a release from the Grocery Products Manufacturers of Canada. Impromptu meals can be fun occasionally, but a succession of haphazard buying choices will take its toll in costs at the checkout counter.

When you buy, consider the basic cost of the food. Is it to be for one meal or stretch into leftovers? Consider its nutritive value. To basic cost add cost in time and fuel consumption. Buy in Season: Foods in season are usually less expensive than those in scant supply.

One-a-week shopping, with a list, promotes economy.

So does reading food ads before you make up the list.

Consider the possibilities in substituting foods. Sometimes margarine makes as good a white sauce as the most expensive butter. Medium eggs are as good for breakfast as extra-large. When you cook, milk

powder can often be substituted for whole milk and cocoa powder for solid chocolate.

Cheese and eggs may be used as a lower-priced substitute for the protein in meat.

If you do, you can consider keeping fuel costs minimal by putting several dishes at a time into the oven. Make a batch of cupcakes when you bake a cake, double the recipe for a casserole and freeze one.

Know Grades: Understand grades and a variety of meat cuts and you can shop economically. Chops and expensive roasts can sometimes give way to steaks, pot roasts, slow-cooked or marinated round steak.

If you do buy premium roasts, plan to use gravies, cream sauces or casseroles to get as much mileage as possible out of the meat.

Use spices to vary tastes to make leftover menus seem like completely new dishes.

If you buy chicken, buy it in one piece and cut it up at home. It is more expensive when the butcher sells it in pieces.
